Worship in a Quaker Tradition

As part of our tradition of spiritual exploration and inquiry, we will worship in the tradition of the Quakers. Quakerism, like all traditions, have diversity in their worship expressions. Today, we will err on the side of Quaker modernism and have some limited direction. <u>Traditional Quaker Worship has silence or "expectant waiting" that draws its members into spirit-filled discernment/reflection</u>, which then leads some to share the message they believe God wants the assembly to hear.

Listening to "God's still small voice" will lead your mind or spirit into thoughts or insights from God that could help the assembly to better understand God's will in the lives of those gathered. These messages might be about the life of our community or how God is moving in society. Other friends are supposed to be receptive to it and just sit with whatever is spoken; it is considered inappropriate to dispute a previous message but knowing that your message might be inspired by a previous comment is okay. Quaker guidance suggests that it is extremely rare for a person to speak more than once in a single meeting.

"Expectant waiting" is a form of prayer or even meditation where one tries to clear the distractions of the day and focus on discerning God's leadings in your life, the assembly or the world. Sometimes it is helpful to use the distractions [noise in sanctuary or mind] as a focus to your prayers. And if you think your insights would deepen or help others in their walk with God, then share it.

Quaker worship is less about an indictment of professional clergy then it is about "abolishing passive laity." We as Congregationalists demand active laity in running the church; Quakers simply apply this to worship life as well.

Some key Quaker teachings, although there are no creeds, that undergird their shared life and worship style include all life being sacred, God is in everyone, God's inward presence being universally experienced, Divine Revelation being continuous, Simplicity – integrity – community and diversity are essential in our search for the truth, seeking truth and unity are goals, and finally the way opens making the ideal attainable.

Everyone is welcome to speak, no eloquence required; <u>Quaker worship prefers</u> <u>simplicity and directness in speech over polished words and opinionated pomposity.</u>

This allows for others to mill and reflect in an open and honest way.

As we move into our time of worship, let us consider the Quaker ways and beliefs as we wait for the spirit to lead us this morning. In good Quaker tradition, let us enter in silence and do our very best to keep it.....

Children's Message.....The Importance of Silence

After the Children's Message, our children are invited to leave with Laurie and learn about God in our Faith Formation Program. Please collect your children in their classrooms after service. After they leave, let us sit in silence and reflect on the importance of children to God and our lives, Rev. Mark's message to our children and the importance of the Season of Lent in our spiritual lives.

Our First Time of Directed Silence: Prayer

Let us spend ten minutes or so quieting our minds and bodies. Then turning our focus on God's presence in our lives and our concern for those around us. A "Weighty Friend" will begin this time with a non-traditional reading of the Lord's Prayer from New Zealand. If you have specific prayers that will unite or uplift the congregation, then feel free to share them: stand and speak where you are clearly, then simply sit back down.

Our Second Time of Directed Silence: Biblical / Theological Reflection

Let us spend 15-20 minutes reflecting on I Kings 19:7-16 [page 254] that will be read at the beginning of this time. Sit with the text, stew over it a bit, think of its implications in your life, the assembly's and the wider world's. If you feel your insight will uplift the congregation or another's life, then feel free to share: stand and speak where you are clearly, then simply sit back down.

The angel of the LORD came a second time, touched him, and said, 'Get up and eat, otherwise the journey will be too much for you.' He got up, and ate and drank; then he went in the strength of that food for forty days and forty nights to Horeb the mount of God. At that place he came to a cave, and spent the night there.

Then the word of the LORD came to him, saying, 'What are you doing here, Elijah?' He answered, 'I have been very zealous for the LORD, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they

are seeking my life, to take it away.'

He said, 'Go out and stand on the mountain before the LORD, for the LORDis about to pass by.' Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the LORD, but the LORD was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the LORD was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the LORD was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. Then there came a voice to him that said, 'What are you doing here, Elijah?' He answered, 'I have been very zealous for the LORD, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away. Then the LORD said to him, 'Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus; when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael as king over Aram. Also you shall anoint Jehu son of Nimshi as king over Israel; and you shall anoint Elisha son of Shaphat of Abel-meholah as prophet in your place.

Our Third Time of Directed Silence: Our Daily Living

After a brief non-biblical reading, we will spend the rest of the hour in silence, reflecting on how God's leading effects how we live in this world. We know God is within everyone and applying that to how we treat our neighbors and enemies is vital in living into Christ's way of life. If you feel your insight will uplift the congregation or another's life, then feel free to share: stand and speak where you are clearly, then simply sit back down.

I am not so much talking about a carefully-tailored philosophic system as about the unorganized but dominant hope which lingers in millions of minds and forms itself into the touchstone of our civilization — the faith that man is sufficient unto himself and has but to strive to bring the good new kingdom in. Hear me, I cry it with all my strength, and my voice rises out of the suffering and the bitter crucible of our times: man is not by nature good. We are all born with a freedom to turn to the good, but the Source of good is Beyond, and the power of human transformation is a given power. We may labor, study and weep for it, which we must do, but in the end it is given.

What else can one read out of our bitter chapter? We have a light within, a light which shows up our poor beggarly selves and points to the all-sufficing God whose life is ever so near yet ever so distant by the immensity of our self-centered wills. Ours is the power to will what God has willed before us. In our human freedom there is no assurance of progress; by ourselves we can only destroy; true freedom consists in our perfect availability to divine will — all else makes for destruction in the long run. The most highly trained and the keenest minds that our world can command, put to work as our guides will, if not bound to the self-

denying spirit which was in Christ, bring us right back to the kind of world we now have. That is what I mean by saying that man is not naturally good. Not only does all absolute human power corrupt but all science and knowledge corrupt, apart from prayer, the everlasting purifier.
