Ponderings from your Pastor.....

For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. Matthew 6:21

In 2008, I arrived at First Church with enthusiasm and hope. The interview process was extensive and the committee diverse and challenging. Despite a 45 minute candidating sermon, we came together and the congregational vote was unanimous. I have never regretted the choice to become your Senior Pastor and bringing my family to Vermont. At one of my first Trustee meetings, it was mentioned that we needed to embark on a capital campaign to repair our facilities and attend to deferred maintenance issues that had plagued the church for way too long. However, we were in the midst of one of the worse economic downturns since the Great Depression. So we put it off, again and again, year after year. Slowly though through good church lay leadership, the need remained on the agenda and the discussion of timing continued to receive attention. Church presidents Maureen McKenzie, Todd Kelley, Beth Warren, Kevin Dorn, Brenda Dawson and now Carl Wermer kept the urgency of need and thought alive until last year when we finally embarked on a capital campaign.

Each president's leadership along with the consecutive Trustee Committee's support laid the foundation for the campaign which we now find ourselves within. Thank God for the incredibly good lay leadership within our church! One of the first steps toward making the campaign a reality was to form a Capital Campaign Exploratory Committee. This committee interviewed companies to help determine our readiness for a capital campaign, accepted a project list long established over the years by the Trustees for just such a campaign, and set a tentative goal based on the projects. Council then hired Full Harvest Fundraising to conduct a feasibility study where 10 % of our church members were interviewed. The feedback from those interviews was taken into account as priorities were shifted and clarity added to some of the projects. Last Spring, Council hired Full Harvest Fundraising to lead us through the planning and implementation of a campaign. Based upon Full Harvest's recommendations, Council established a new Capital Campaign Steering Committee in October 2017. The newly formed Steering Committee immediately started working and Council approved the hiring of architect John Alden to assist in the development of detailed project proposals and cost estimates. The project list was further refined based upon this input and a few new projects were identified. A new campaign goal (including a stretch goal) was proposed and then approved by Council. The Steering Committee established the *Our Home, Our Future, Our Time* theme, set up congregational opportunities for information sharing and feedback. And then, at our Annual Meeting on January 28th, the congregation unanimously said to move forward.

At this point, the process began in earnest. As in all capital campaigns, brochures, letters and graphs to explain every aspect of the campaign were created. The Steering Committee established a timeline to conduct the campaign in two phases. The first phase involved training a group of volunteers to become "campaign visitors" so that they could reach out to current and past church leaders to ask for their pledges first. The results of this "quiet phase" of the campaign will be shared at a big public Kick-Off Celebration on April 8^{th.} Then the second phase of the campaign will begin, and the rest of the congregation and public will be invited to give through visits, small group gatherings and invitational letters. It is a well-established process and I have been a part of two other campaigns that operated in exact same way.

It is always hoped that the first phase will raise a significant portion of the goal. When that occurs, the energy and excitement and sense of possibility generated by that success often inspires the second group to take us over the top, and everyone celebrates the faith and generosity so clearly expressed in the gifts. Each group and step of the process is vital to the success of the campaign. I would dare say that the last group that takes us over the top is the most important key to success. Gifts big and small appear at that time and when everyone participates and gives what they can, then together we can make it.

We are nearing the end of the quiet phase and there is a big Kick Off Celebration planned for April 8th to initiate the last phase of giving. You do not want to miss it!!! Thank you to all of you who have offered a pledge or are considering doing so. As the giving circle expands to include everyone, I would earnestly ask all of you to prayerfully consider your pledge and give what you can for I am firmly convinced that the health and strength of our church's witness in our community is ever needed in these days. I cannot imagine needing less food for the hungry or less hope for the discouraged or fewer healthy values offered to our children or a less vibrant and healthy ministry to our members. I imagine in the future that the need for our church to inspire and support our members and wider community will only and inevitably increase.

A successful Capital Campaign will help accomplish this ever vital task. I invite you to join a movement that has been building in our church since my arrival in 2008. Join the chorus of voices and volunteers that have invested hundreds of hours over the years and heartfelt commitment to the cause of our church. Allow your love for God and this church to move your heart to give joyously. Honored to be a part of this process with you, I am

Did God give me Crohn's Disease?

When I was 18 years old, I experienced gut wrenching pain. I was keeled over, barely able to walk. My mother drove me to the hospital. It was Friday morning. At first, the doctors thought I was experiencing an appendicitis. The scan that I went through showed that that was not the case. The doctors did not know what was wrong. I was admitted to the hospital, restricted to water. Eventually they realized since I was experiencing pain in the gut that I needed to undergo a colonoscopy; however, the gastroenterologist would not be in the hospital until Monday. After the procedure, I was diagnosed with Crohn's disease. I was given antibiotics and prednisone to relieve the inflammation. I spent seven days in the hospital. A week prior I had weighed about 130, seven days later I weighed 120. That was eleven years ago. Crohn's disease is an autoimmune disorder that can occur anywhere in the digestive track. It's an inflammatory disease. In other words, my immune system attacks, inflaming, the space between the small and large intestine. Thankfully, I have not had a single surgery yet. Often many people who are diagnosed with Crohn's disease the first time do so because they need to have surgery to remove part of their intestine. I'm lucky. I haven't had that. For most of the last eleven years, I have not had much intestinal pain. Though, I have experienced some, and I would say that I have experienced a bit more in the last year. I now undergo a colonoscopy once a year. Not that you wanted to know how often I have colonoscopies, but back to "Did God give me Crohn's disease? I would say, no. The more likely answer is that a combination of things led to me having Crohn's disease. They might be: overly prescribed antibiotics for ear infections when I was an infant; a poor diet; stress; and maybe, genetics. But where is God in my intestinal pain? God is with me in the moments when my gut feels icky, reminding me of God's love and care for me, despite the conditions that gave me Crohn's disease. God is also with me in my meaning making. Meaning making goes beyond saying 2 + 2 = 4. Meaning making says, I have 4, now how does this inform my life, how do I make sense of it. For me, having Crohn's disease has heightened my empathy for others. It has allowed me to see that others suffer too, and they sometimes need someone to know intimately the kind of suffering they are experiencing. Crohn's disease has also made me more passionate about the need for others to have access to health care. In other words, God is with me, and God is with others, and God reminds us to be with each other, especially in moments of pain and suffering. And I thank God for that!

A lifelong faith ... isn't that what we pray for?! For us, for our loved ones and especially for our children and our grandchildren.

Church has changed over the years. Our children and youth programs have changed and continue to change with the times. Their titles have changed from Church School to Sunday School to Faith Formation. Notice that school is no longer in the title. Our format has shifted to building relationships and having the kids and youth more involved in the learning and discussions that we have...free to ask questions while still giving them the opportunity to learn and grow in their faith. Church used to be the place where everyone gathered to study, memorize scripture and be tested. But our society has changed and with it the church has been changing because of it. Technology and society has played a key role and with the internet and all the gadgets we have...so much available to us at our fingertips. You can use a Bible app or a Bible website to look up scripture. Families' structures are different. In the majority of families both parents are working, they see their children less during the week and weekends are a time to catch up as a family and reconnect. We have many more opportunities available to us, so much we can do on our weekends, that church is now in competition for time. Stores are open on Sundays when they never used to be. Sport teams have practices or even games on Sundays when they never used to. Many grandparents don't live in the same town or even the same state as their grandkids, so families are traveling more than they used to keep their family close. So many fun things to go and do on a Sunday. You all know this. We as a church are now seeing families less often then we used to. Even in the eight years that I've been with you all here at First Church we've seen this become even more evident. Families that once used to attend every week or a few times a month are now attending once a month or sometimes seasonally, depending on the season and if the sport or activity their child is in is over.

The church continues to be here to help and offers programs, information, experiences, relationship building and faith development. We just need to continue to adjust what we offer and what fits the needs of our families. The National Study on Youth and Religion has found that 'the single most important social influence on the religious and spiritual lives of adolescence is their parents. However, many parents feel inadequate to take on this role of being their child's primary teacher of the faith.' Our society has shifted this away from the church to the parents. So this leads me to ask... what can First Church do for you? What are we not offering now that we could offer? What do you as a parent need to help you be the best religious and spiritual social influence for your child? What should we continue, what should we change? What do you need to help you in building a lifelong faith for your child? Please, share your thoughts with me.

As this church moves into the next 150 years, I pray we may continue to find new ways to enliven our programs so that all parents and grandparents of today feel supported as they live out their life of faith ...continue their journey with God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit...help share this love with their children and grandchildren...keeping their faith alive so that they can support the future generations as they grow every hour of every day...getting to know and grow in, a love that is like no other.

Tax Return Tells You How Generous You Really Are

Before you file your tax return away for the year, you might want to take a minute to determine what percentage you are giving away. Jesus told us, "Much will be required of the person entrusted with much, and still more will be demanded of the person entrusted with more." (Luke 12:48)



Your tax return tells you not only how much income God has entrusted to you last year, but also what portion you gave away. Simply take your total charitable contribution and divide it by your total gross income. Move the decimal point over two places. This is the percentage you gave away last year. Are you pleased with that number? If not, make plans now to improve your giving in 2018!

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN NEWS

Leaving A Larger Legacy: How YOU Can Make a Greater Impact with your Capital Campaign Pledge!

True or False?...The largest pledges in a capital campaign come from the wealthiest donors.

False! In fact, the larger pledges often come from people with a high level of commitment and a one-time opportunity to donate a resource that feels significant to them, perhaps the largest gift they've ever made. Here are some real-life examples from recent church-related capital campaigns:

- One of the largest pledges in a \$2 million campaign for a church camp in Maine came from a 91-year-old retired teacher with no history of large gifts a man who lived in modest circumstances. His pledge was instrumental in completing the campaign and in inspiring others to top the goal. When asked what inspired his pledge, he said that his wife had recently died and he felt moved to keep her memory alive through a gift that would provide resources for young people. Where did the dollars come from? From savings they had set aside in case *he* predeceased *her*. As he spoke of his gift, he shared how good it felt to remember her this way.
- A church capital campaign volunteer and his wife were in the process of retiring and planning how much money they might need to live on. At the same time, they wanted to make as large a commitment as they could to support their church's restoration project. They consulted a financial adviser who informed the man that because he was over age 70 ½, he was subject to Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) rules. The advisor explained that he could distribute otherwise taxable traditional and Roth IRA amounts **directly** to his church, and thereby eliminate the Federal income tax liability on the distribution.
- A younger couple received a gift of stock from a grandparent as a wedding present 20 years ago, and the stock grew in value. Knowing that they wanted to support the church's Capital Campaign, the couple spoke with their financial advisor who told them they could donate the stock to the church without having to pay any capital gains tax: the church would receive the full current market value of the stock, and the couple could take that full value as a tax deduction.
- A man who lived in *very* modest circumstances wanted to give something to help the church's campaign. He owned one key asset: a woodlot. He cut and sold his wood and gave one of the larger pledges to the campaign with the proceeds!
- A member of one church came forward with a question: though she herself had little in assets or income, she was a descendant of a well-known illustrator and painter. Could she donate a small painting to the campaign? In the end, she sold the painting through an art auctioneer and donated the proceeds to the campaign providing a gift that was worth many times what she thought she could give!
- And finally, a church member told the leaders of her church that she had already put a bequest to the church in her estate plan for after she died. Knowing that a bequest couldn't be counted toward her pledge to the upcoming capital campaign, she decided to liquidate the assets that would have gone to the bequest. This way the campaign could use the money now, and she would still be here to enjoy the fruits of her gift!

There are so many ways to fund a gift or pledge that you may not even have considered. While the church in no way recommends any particular course of action – that is up to you, your family, and your financial advisers – we would like to share a few of the ways you might consider:

- Donate stock with capital gains
- Distribute taxable traditional & Roth IRA amounts directly to the church. Qualified charitable distributions count as a distribution for purposes of the Required Minimum Distribution rules, and are not subject to income tax.
- Donate a piece of marketable personal property (with value to be established by third party appraisal)
- Donate marketable real estate a summer camp no longer used by the family, a plot of land no longer needed
- Talk with a tax specialist about what balance of income and tax planning can best help your retirement plans and how a generous pledge to the church's campaign can help!

Certain "In-kind" donations from businesses – usually materials required for the building project – can be helpful.
 Many projects have specified lists of construction items that can be donated in bulk. Check with your campaign Trustees to see what items are needed!

Yes, there are many ways to consider a pledge or gift that is larger than you may have dreamed! Where there's a strong desire to give, the means often reveal themselves. Talk with your family and financial advisor to find out what might be possible for you!



Dismas House

Across the state of Vermont there are four Dismas Houses that provide shelter and support to men and women making the difficult transition from incarceration to new lives. For several years now, we have once a month been serving a dinner on the 4th Wednesday of the month to the residents of the Winooski Dismas. Living there is a professional manager along with 10-15 people who have been released after serving their prison terms. Our



service to Dismas House comes from our belief that all of us are imperfect human beings, but that we all have the potential to be better people, and that that potential can be best realized with the support of others. Our participation in this program helps to lessen the feelings of estrangement that people released from prison are often burdened with. The residents are staff are extremely friendly and appreciative of our help. We are currently looking for volunteers for April 25th. Please contact Ed Steele at 871-5897 or edwardmsteele@msn.com if interested or with any questions. A sign-up sheet is in the hallway exiting Fellowship Hall. We need four people to volunteer for each date (space is limited so that the residents and guests have a meaningful dinner experience. Our FCCEJ group will decide the menu to feed 12-16 people (which includes the FCCEJ cooks), and then purchase and prepare the food (typically includes the main course as well as vegetables or salad – dessert is optional). The Dismas House provides beverages, condiments, set-up and clean-up. There is no age on who can volunteer, great for retired folks on down and you can donate part of the meal even if you are not able to attend.


