A Pastor Ponders.....

This last summer, such joy came my way as we stretched our reach to some of the great National Parks out West: Yellowstone, Grand Tetons and the Badlands. Experiencing the mountains, seeing the bison roam freely, standing atop a mountain and enjoying the vista of a 10,500' granite monument of God's grandeur, or sitting in the grand lodge overlooking icy waters of high mountain lakes: these are all treats that blessed my life this past summer. There is not much I love more than getting in my camper with family in tow and traipsing all over the place, never knowing exactly what we will find or what experiences await.

But home always awaits. Working my mind and heart away from the wildness of unexpected realities and into the rhythms and schedules of my normal life is always a transition that takes some time. Fall is upon us though: my kids are back in school, church meetings defining my nights and the regularity of life returning. Slowly, albeit reluctantly, I return to the comfort of the life created over decades. Books and projects, new initiatives and old relationships, wood for the all nighter and sweaters unpacked: all wash over me and bring me great comfort. I cannot wait for the first fire, the first snow, dance recitals, school projects, driving the kids around to their appointments, soups and fresh bread around the table on a cold winter's night.

Upon reflection, I was ready to be home, to return to the life I have created; to laugh, cry and talk with the people in my life I treasure; to draw strength from the home I love, the community I have chosen to live; to return to the seasons and cycles of my life. The leaves beginning to show the colors of fall is simply a reminder of the pull that order has in my life.

This is the primordial tension: chaos verses order. God brings order to a universe mired in disarray and the battle that goes on each day in our members and society is not between life and death or morality and immorality but between chaos and order. In this day of tension and turmoil, I believe what we crave and miss is order. Everything seems up for grabs, fleeting, amorphous. The church with all of its faults and darkness is a reminder that order is God's wish for all of us and society. Nations may totter, justice seem fleeting, moral values diminish and yet the church's message that God loves us and we should stand up for peace for all people is a light that will see us through, a hope that will displace the darkness and a voice to follow.

As we shift the wild summer attitudes into mundane ways of living, let us re-commit ourselves to the invaluable order of belonging to a faith community and committing ourselves and our families to standing up for peace and hope.

October 28th ~ Reformation / Bible Sunday

One of the very oldest traditions in the Protestant Church and New England Congregations is to honor Martin Luther's emphasis of translating the bible into everyone's native tongues so that they can read the Good News for themselves is to give our 3rd graders new bibles. We do so on the anniversary of Martin Luther's posting of the 95 theses on the doors of the Castle Church [start of the Protestant Reformation] in Wittenberg, Germany. On October 28th, we will give our 3rd graders and anyone older who does not already have one, a bible. Bring your 3rd grader to receive their own bible and come to participate in our celebration of Reformation Sunday.

ASSOCIATE PASTOR NEWS

After my September 16th sermon, I was asked by someone, what can I do to help work on immigration issues. My advice to this person applies to many, many issues. A good place to start is to ask the people who are most affected what they think. In terms of immigration and migrant justice issues, I recommend calling Migrant Justice a nonprofit that works with migrants in Vermont. A simple call, saying, "I'm interested in assisting you in your work? I'm interested in learning more, what are some ways that I might be able to learn more and to assist you?" Since Migrant Justice is a non-profit, like many other organizations that work on solving issues or helping others, assuredly there is something you can do—it might be monetary and/or helping with a project. When the organization says yes, I recommend before working with the organization is that you go with an open mind. You might have an idea on how to best assist them or what needs to be done to solve the issue. I believe the best way to solve an issue or to assist another person is to ask the person/s directly affected what they need rather than what I think they need or think is the best approach to solving the issue. This does not exclude me from having my own ideas, but going directly to the person/s affected, my ideas will be better informed. Part of this approach is to shift my paradigm from my economic self-interest to having empathy for the person/s directly impacted. In other words, the approach to assisting or working on an issue comes from the perspective of the person/s directly affected. In terms of immigration, I want to hear personal stories of those who decided to leave their country to come to America. I want to hear those stories from those who came here through the official process the government setup and those who did not. When we take this approach, not only do we feel like we're assisting, we are also helping empower those most affected.

Another important piece to assisting or working on an issue is to be connected spiritually. James writes, "faith without works is dead," but works without faith leads to burnout. Faith, trust, in God's presence in you sustains your work.

So, I have done and will continue to clear items out of my office and offer them to you all to take home, give to a friend or neighbor and use to help deepen your family's faith life and journey. You will see a Family Resource table in Fellowship Hall on Sunday mornings. On it you will see Take Out Church boxes, more supplies to restock your Take Out Church box you already have and many resource books of crafts, activities, devotions and more for you as a family to do at home. I hope you will stop by this table every week you are here and let me know if there is something you need that you are not finding there. Let me know how I can resource you and your family.

I continue to recruit and look for volunteers to be a part of our Faith Formation programs. If you are hearing a call to connect and wonder where you might serve, please be in touch. I'd love to chat with you.

May we all continue to grow in faith and know that we have the support of those around us here at church to lean on and reconnect with every week and every month.

Our Home, Our Future, Our Time...



As this newsletter goes to print, the Our Home, Our Future, Our Time Capital Campaign has received gifts and pledges of \$935,666. We went way over the top of our initial goal of \$822,000 and we are inching ever closer to our \$1.02 million stretch goal! In this season of gratitude, we give thanks for the incredible support of Our Home and for all of YOU. Way to go FCCEJ!

Campaign Project Update...Over the summer months, two roofing companies have replaced all the asphalt shingles on our buildings and repaired the slate roofs. New gutters have been installed to help better manage water runoff. We also hope to complete the replacement of old windows on the parsonage side of the building this fall. The Trustees are sending out a request for bids on the parking lot and vestibule/ADA bathroom addition near Fellowship Hall. Rather than tear apart that entrance to the church during our busy Holiday Craft Fair and Advent season, the Trustees have decided to schedule the parking lot work for late spring/early summer 2019. This will also allow time for the Trustees to hire a General Contractor to oversee this complex and multi-faceted project. Also, work on the organ repairs and maintenance will take place in spring 2019, either before or after Easter. It is so exciting and heartwarming to see the results of all our fundraising to date – YOU have made this possible! And the great news is that we will continue to see new projects take shape and unfold in the months ahead. The Trustees are working hard to finalize project details, secure bids and coordinate all of the projects. They are responsible for spending the funds we have raised to ensure our church is truly OUR HOME.

Farewell Rocket Ship!

As the Campaign Steering Committee shifts our focus away from active fundraising toward the important (and exciting!) work of project implementation, we have decided to say farewell to the Campaign thermometer (yes, the rocket ship) on the front lawn. We will have a smaller sign inside so that we can still show people our progress. After all, new gifts continue to come in, and every gift we receive will help us **FILL THE HEART** and make all our stretch goal projects possible. Once we have made more progress on the construction front, and have a better sense of our actual costs for the initial projects, then we can turn our attention back to raising those remaining stretch goal dollars. FCCEJ Jamaica 2015 Team Reflections ~ Mandy Wark

I always looked forward to mission trips with FCCEJ-from service work in Buffalo, New York to learning about Heifer International while volunteering on the farm in Massachusetts, each trip brought new opportunities to have fun with members of our church family, and to give back to another community. I hold the memories, as well as the people I met along the way, close to heart. When I decided to sign up for the Jamaica trip, I was just as nervous as I was excited. I had no idea that the trip would change my life in the ways that it did.



During our short time in St. Thomas, Jamaica, I was exposed to the realities of poverty in a way that turned my idea of the world, and my faith, on its axis. I still remember the weight of these truths as we drove through the country, watching the lives rushing by behind the safety of the bus windows. I thought of my home, my school, my church, and how much I wanted to break through the glass, to do something real. This trip allowed us to do something to help the members of a community who are just as deserving of love and support as anyone else, and yet they do not have many of the things we take for granted.

The service trip to Jamaica opened my eyes to how much I still had to learn about the world, and I have since been "bitten by the travel bug", as my mom likes to say. I traveled abroad to India after joining a global leadership development group at school called Girl Up, which empowers youth and encourages gender equality. I used what I learned in Jamaica and in India to help plan fundraisers, and was inspired to learn more about youth advocacy and global health. I have Jamaica to thank for all of my experiences abroad during my studies, as well as the plans I have for my future.

The lasting impact that this trip had on our group was clear in the conversations with some of the youth members of the trip to Jamaica. Abigail Evans, a junior at Saint Lawrence University, reflected on having the chance to meet the children and teachers who would be using the community center we helped restore. "I still remember how grateful every single community member was; some were even brought to tears.

The work we did there was greatly appreciated and the community made sure to remind us of that whenever they had the chance. That is a feeling I will never forget." For Nicholas Bouffard, a junior at UVM, the experience helped him to connect with different perspectives and realize the potential for using his own privilege to help others. "The experience grounded me in the privileges I had from the start and echo through my own interactions on campus as a tour guide and a senator of the student government, welcoming people of all means to UVM. I have since had a point of common ground with my religious peers and a springboard for conversations and relationships alike." We were all blessed to have the support of a church community that inspires such endeavors, and to have the chance to give back.
