During a meeting before Thanksgiving, the chairperson asked everyone to express what one thing they were looking forward to this next year. One person mentioned taking a long awaited vacation to a wonderful island paradise, another lifted up the upcoming birth of his first grandchild, another prayed for continued health seeing how they had just been through multiple surgeries and exhausting PT, yet another was hoping to hit the lottery so that they could pay off their debt and purchase some needed and not so needed items of life: all had a concrete idea of what hope meant in their life. All except one person, a middle aged man. He was not the first to go, but rather had some time to think about it and yet, when the sharing arrived to his position, he hemmed and hawed, then said something like, oh, nothing really......and that was it.

Having that man not have any hopes for the future threw me for quite a loop. It was impossible for me to envision a world without hope. How can someone not have any hope for the future, not have an image of a better life, not envision improved health, healthier family dynamics, a more stable financial position, politics not quite so negative, no place to explore, no room for self -improvements, etc?

If you read books by people who are imprisoned and trapped in utterly hopeless situations, so many of them hope for freedom. Martin Luther King Jr, Ann Frank, Elie Wiesel, Desmond Tutu, Nelson Mandela, prisoners of war, Christopher Reeves, Helen Keller, Winston Churchill and a bombed out England, Christians worshipping in small closets in the heart of communist Russia, Armanda Valladares slowly rotting in a Cuban prison, Joan Baynham struggling with an aggressive cancer, parents anxiously waiting for their opioid addicted daughter to agree to get help.....even in the most dire of circumstances, people in all ages, cultures and theologies have grasped for hope like a rope dangling just out of reach. It keeps folks going and ironically grounded. Hope keeps people and movements alive to face another day, another cause, another change to obtain health and wholeness in a world that seems otherwise. How is it that one man could not conjure the foundation of all yearnings?

We all need hope and sometimes hope is the only think that keeps us able to wake up to face another day. Advent and Christ coming into the world embodies hope's primordial presence within us. The prophesies, the babe in the manger, Moses floating down the Nile as an infant, the ark bobbing up and down in torrential seas, Esau travelling to ask forgiveness of his brother, Joseph anguishly weeping in the back room while his family waits outside, Mary and Martha sending for Jesus, small groups of people strategizing in darkened rooms by candlelight.....that Advent hope for Christ is all around us and within us.

Let us thank God for that seed planted so deeply within. Let us be grateful that our faith and tradition lifts hope up so clearly. Let us all run with abandon to the Divine Light that pierced the darkness so long ago and continues to guide lives and societies toward better lives and a healthier world.

Welcome to the beginning of the Christian Church new year! We begin every Christian new year with Advent and the season of Christmas. Advent is about waiting for the birth of Christ. Every Advent I imagine living in a world where the story Christ's birth has yet to be told. I want to feel the deep desire and longing for the foretold birth of the Messiah, the Anointed One. In the first century, the people of Israel longingly hoped for someone to bring them hope and to restore the sanctity of the temple and to be removed of the Roman Empire. It must have brought great joy to those who learned that the Messiah, the Anointed One, was born. In the Christmas story, we hear of migrating Shepherds nervous but happy to hear of the birth of Jesus; majestic Angels who tell them to "Not be Afraid;" foreign Magi from the East (modern Iraq and Iran) coming to worship the new born King. Has so much hope and promise ever been place on such a little baby before? Jesus' ministry proved the hope was not misguided. The birth of Christ didn't automatically lead to the sanctity of the temple or to the removal of the Roman Empire, yet the birth has reverberated and has changed society ever since. So, each Advent, I wait expectantly for Christ birth, and I am more and more delighted that he was born—living through the shadows of time I appreciate more and more joy of Christ the King.

This Advent on Sunday, December 16th, 7pm join us for a Blue Christmas Service. The Advent and Christmas seasons can be challenging times for people. We offer the Blue Christmas Service as a healing service. Our service will not hide from the grief we bear that become more acute during the holiday season. We will gather together to find support and hope with each other. This is also a healing service so come and lay your burdens down with us—regardless if your burdens are the death of a loved one, the separation from your family, the discord you might have with a friend/s.

High School Youth Group time in December is dedicated to Christmas Pageant rehearsals. We meet for rehearsals on Sunday, December 2nd, 5-7pm; Sunday, December 9th, after second service; Saturday, December 15, TBA, and then Pageant Sunday is December 16th, both services.

MISSION OPPORTUNITIES

Missions Moment

For almost the past 10 years, Faith Formation has evolved into what it is today, including Hands-On Mission Sundays. We asked Laurie to tell us about how this evolution has taken place.



Soon after Laurie arrived as our Christian Education coordinator in August of 2009, she realized that our congregation, like many others, had a hard time having enough leaders for the classes during school breaks and on holiday weekends. After a discussion with other CE members and staff, they decided to center all group activities in 2010 around the season at the time, the offering that had been chosen or a faith practice like praying or baking pretzels. From 2010-2012, these activities went from being a rotation to stations that the children did in age groups where they would take part in seasonal hands-on activities in the peer rooms and rotate through them.

In the fall of 2013, they were then called Group Activity Days and were turning into more of a full age group activity that would aid in building community among the children and youth and help them all get to know each other better as the children attending are from different schools as well as different towns, such as Colchester, Milton, Jericho, Williston, Essex Town, Essex Junction and Waterbury.

In the fall of 2017, another evolution took place and the name changed to Hands-On Mission Sundays. More and more parents were liking the idea of their children talking about and doing mission activities, so the name fit the activity. In the Spring of 2018, Laurie came to the Missions Committee and asked us, as a committee, if we would like to be more connected and help brainstorm ideas and perhaps be more handson ourselves with these faith formation days. We assisted on a few of these days during the last curriculum year.

As faith formation keeps evolving and church life keeps changing and families have more and more going on and the CE staff and committee try to keep families connected and involved, the programs will need to stay fresh and exciting. Laurie says that she is sure in the next few years, Hands-On will likely change once again.

Dismas House ~ Your Good Deed Will be Much Appreciated

Across Vermont there are four Dismas Houses that provide shelter and support for men and women who have served prison terms and are making the transition from life in prison to life outside. For several years now, First Congregational Church members have been serving dinner on the 4th Wednesday of each month to the residents of the Dismas House in Winooski. Our participation in this program is of great value in lessening the feelings of estrangement that burden many who have served prison terms. The residents of Dismas House and the paid staff are friendly

and appreciative of our help. The staff includes a paid Director and Associate Director who are at Dismas House during weekdays, including during the evening meal. Three of our members prepare the fourth Wednesday dinner. One of us prepares an entry, another a salad, and a third, a dessert. After we've taken the food to Dismas house, we usually stay and enjoy the meal with the Dismas House residents and staff. 5th Annual Jamaica Cabin Fever Calcutta





CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

Our Home, Our Future, Our Time...

We are making progress! On behalf of the Capital Campaign Steering Committee, we have several exciting project updates to share with you.



The plans for the new vestibule and ADA bathroom near Fellowship Hall have been finalized, and the Trustees are in the process of getting bids from potential contractors. The plan is to begin work on the vestibule and bathroom by April 1, followed by work on the parking lot/site improvements in June. A General Contractor will be hired to oversee this complex and multi-faceted project. We will not be able to use the parking lot entrance while this work takes place, however the Trustees will be working on some new signage and temporary entrance accommodations to minimize the disruption. Stay tuned for more details as we get closer to construction.

The other major work to be completed in 2019 is the Sanctuary Restoration Project, which includes the refurbishing of our historic windows and wooden blinds, plaster repair and a fresh coat of paint throughout the sanctuary (even the pews!). The sanctuary restoration was the number one priority identified by the congregation through our feasibility study, and doing this work will restore and preserve the beauty of **Our Home** for years to come. There will be an opportunity for the congregation to give input into a new sanctuary paint color once we have awarded a contract for the restoration work and we have a better sense of how long that project will take. We have applied for a Historic Preservation Grant to help cover some of our expenses. Grant decisions will be made in early December. Based on the report from historic architect specialist Sally Fishburn, we anticipate that the sanctuary will be open throughout these renovations. We will keep you updated if that changes. For more information about the window and plaster renovation project, Sally Fishburn's full report is available on our website under Capital Campaign Projects.

Last but not least, initial organ repair and maintenance work will take place in spring 2019, either before or after Easter and a contractor has been selected to replace the parsonage parking lot with pavers, which will also occur in the spring.

Thank you all for continuing to support the **Our Home, Our Future, Our Time Capital Campaign**. Our pledge total stands at \$935,616. We appreciate all of the pledge payments made so far, and all of the early pledge payments. As a result, we do not anticipate needing bridge loan financing to complete the projects above. We continue to accept new gifts for the campaign to help us "fill our heart" and reach our \$1.02 million stretch goal. 


Got Coats?
