# The Spirit at First March 2019

"At exactly the same time when Jesus was growing up, there was a movement---call it a political movement, a religious movement, or [as Josephus calls it] a 'philosophy'----that said that it was time for God alone to be king."

N.T. Wright: Simply Jesus, pg 41

The Searchers are learning about Jesus and the world in which he grew up and what it means for our lives today as understood by theologian and teacher N.T. Wright. It is a little more traditional reading than we are used to in the Searchers but it opens up to us a new avenue to discuss the faith and apply it to our lives especially around the key figure of Jesus: the central figure of our faith.

What does it mean to say that Jesus believed that God should be king? Jesus did not understand his role as taking on the traditional role of kingship as understood by the Jews nor does it look like he had any interest in becoming the Emperor of the Roman Empire. Jesus modeled a different type of kingship that included servanthood, justice, mercy, forgiveness and healing. He resorted to words instead of wars. He welcomed everyone into his kingdom, even those who disagreed with him and were proven to be unworthy. His go to rule was love and treating your neighbor the way you would like to be treated. How do we claim his mantle for our current culture?

The lectionary group I attended yesterday struggled with Christ's treatment of an enemy that is entrenched in hatred against you and willing to use violence as a weapon. We dallied with everything from pacifism to the church's just war theory. We struggled with whether you can love your enemy and still hold them accountable and guard against their destructive behaviors directed against you. We do this with child abusers but can we do it with terrorists? Can we respond with non-violent resistance or is that naïve when confronted with such cruel intentions? Does using force and violence to contain threats to our existence just end up perpetuating a system of economic oppression from the very few against the many....with hindsight it seems that war often tends to do just that?

We all agreed that Christ's teaching regarding loving our enemies separates us as people of faith from most other philosophies: religious, political or cultural. Thus, it is crucial we struggle with how to live into Christ's gospel where our enemy is a precious child of God.

Today, as the world lurches right, as various groupings of humanity are pitted against each other, as wealth is controlled by fewer and fewer people, as geopolitical realities seem to be ushering us toward war yet again and as anxiety and fear seem to be on the rise with a vast majority of the people on our planet, we might want to revisit the life and teachings on the greatest teacher who ever lived, one we call friend and Savior and even King.

How does caring for our enemies change our politics both internally and externally? How does offering our shirt in addition to our coat change the dynamics of economic policy? How does turning your cheek to an enemy who wants to kill you help solve the complicated equation of geopolitical realities? How does Christ's radical concept of love affect the way we interact with those we disagree with politically in our country? How is it even possible to love people who belong to ISIS and want nothing more to destroy the United States of America? I do not have the answers to these questions, but feel strongly that these are exactly the questions we should be asking of ourselves and our leaders. Christ, in a time when people had fewer rights and less power encouraged those who followed him to discuss these things. And so I hand over his challenge to all of you. Apply your faith to your interactions with family members who think you are an idiot to support the candidate you do. In your workplace, be a productive force for compassion and peace. Refuse to gossip and demonize others in the community. Seek understanding with peoples that think radically different than ourselves. I believe the discussion and shifting our own attitudes will help our personal outlook and perhaps even help to change the world. Crazy I know, but then I follow a man who was pretty radical in his thinking. Join me. Blessings, Rev. Mark

The season of Lent was developed after Easter and the early church's celebration of Christ's resurrection. The second liturgical season was used to teach people about the faith and prepare them to join the church, which always took place as the sun rose on Easter morning. New Member classes were a year long and the members watched the new initiates to make sure they were worthy of the calling. As the season of Lent developed and other seasons emerged, Lent shortened to forty days and started on a Wednesday. Thus, Ash Wednesday became the start of Lent and encouraged people to deepen their faith by adopting spiritual practices and preparing for Easter. It remains so today and I would encourage everyone to avail yourself of this ancient rite of passage. Taking a little extra time to deepen your spirituality is always a good practice and Rev. Mark has changed it a bit so that it is not so dour and depressing but rather an exercise in thoughtful reflection.

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## ASSOCIATE PASTOR NEWS



We are fortunate to live in a time when democracy is the norm. Sure, there are struggles with making sure democratic process include more and more people, but for the most part, those who seek to change have a constructive avenue to do so. Jesus and his followers did not have a democratic avenue to solve their issues. They couldn't merely

wait for the next election to elect a new person or couldn't run for office themselves. There was no democratic process to removing leaders who abused their power or to process to change policy to better their community. We do have the message that Jesus preached: blessed are the poor; blessed are you who are hungry now; blessed are you who weep now. He also transformed lives through healing. In a democratic society, we help transform lives and bless people through changing the systems within which we live. We have the power as citizens to make our society work better for more people, allowing more people to live with dignity.

When I visited the search committee for the onsite visit, I heard about the cost of housing in our area of Vermont. The Department of Housing and Urban Development defines affordable housing as "paying no more than 30% [person's] income for housing cost, including utilities." The Vermont Housing and Conservation Board report that "Fully 47.5% of all Vermont renters pay more than 30% of their income for housing costs" and "the median price of a primary residence in 2018 was \$217, 500, requiring an annual household income of \$68, 635 and \$20, 695 in cash at closing, while the Vermont median income was \$57,808." As seen, affordable housing as an issue impacts more than low-income earners; it impacts many. Part of the solution to affordable housing is more, better paying jobs. Another way to help with providing affordable housing is to advocate for more financial support for funds like the Vermont Housing and Conservation Board. VHCB works with private capital to fund affordable housing projects and land conservation in Vermont.

I recently spent a day to advocate legislators to fully fund the VHCB. The Vermont Housing and Conservation Coalition (VHCC), a group that advocates on behalf of affordable housing and conservation, hosted a Legislative Day. VHCC provided information on what they were requesting and provided a training on how to talk to our legislators. Being a citizen advocate can feel daunting. I found that once my feet were wet, after talking to one of my legislators, then the conversation with the next one went more smoothly. Having these conversations is like swimming it's unfamiliar until you start swimming and then you can't stop swimming. It's also nice because most of our legislators want to hear from their constituents, and since they are not full-time legislators, constituents often provide helpful information that they didn't know. Citizens collectively informing their representatives and advocating on behalf of an issue is a powerful force. It does ensure that our legislators, at least, are aware of the issues that are important to us, in this case affordable housing.

I have been working with a group from Essex, Jericho, and Underhill learning about affordable housing and then advocating for more affordable housing and solutions to ensure that more Vermonters are able to afford housing. There are policies we can advocate for locally that would help provide affordable housing. Many of us could benefit from a group that tries to advocate solutions to housing that many of us need.

As I sit down to write this article I am checking the list minute items off my to do list before I leave for the west coast to visit four more vibrant United Church of Christ churches. On my January road trip to Connecticut we connected with six churches and their staff in ten days. Then in February came a fast weekend trip to Massachusetts visiting with four more UCC vibrant churches and their staff. Needless to say, I have been taking a lot of pictures, many notes and gathering lots of information and ideas. I will connected with you all again on Facebook as I travel to Eugene, OR and Seattle & Bellingham, WA.

My first Sunday back will be March 10<sup>th</sup>, the first Sunday in Lent and I will have missed the Ash Wednesday service. I always look forward to that service and so my Lenten season will be starting off different this year. Lent is a season that in it's history one was asked to give something up. I have moved away from that and instead follow the more progressive modern idea of taking something on. Maybe it's something we have fallen away from keeping up with or maybe it's something new. I haven't decided what that is yet, but I'm guessing that something will come to mind while I'm visiting the churches on the west coast and seeing and hearing how they prepare and start their Lenten seasons. We will also be one week away from Pretzel Sunday, coming up on March 17<sup>th</sup>. A really fun Sunday in Lent when we smell and eat pretzels, but also are reminded of how good it is to pray to our God and hear about arms folded over on our chest as a way to pray.

Lent is time when we try to be more intentional about our daily devotional life and prayer time with our God. If you are one who would prefer to have a daily devotion in your inbox of your email, you can subcribe to the UCC's daily devotions at <a href="http://www.ucc.org/daily\_devotional">http://www.ucc.org/daily\_devotional</a>. We will have some Lenten devotional here that you can pick up. I'm sure you can find a quiet place in your house to sit, maybe it's where the sunshine can touch you as it radiats through your window. Maybe you have that soft comfy chair that everyone in your house knows is your place to sit. I would like to encourage you to place your bible close by, if it's not there already, then add your devotional to that space and set aside ten minutes of your day to sit and connect with your God.

For those of you who like a little history lesson ... Lent is a 40 day journey, not counting Sundays, until we arrive at Easter. According to the Bible, Jesus' death and resurrection occurred around the time of the Jewish Passover, which was celebrated on the first full moon following the vernal equinox. For Christians, today, Easter Sunday falls on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox (or the first day of spring). If the first full moon occurs on the equinox, Easter is the following Sunday. So ... Easter Sunday can fall anywhere between March 22 and April 25<sup>th</sup>. Once you know when Easter Sunday is...you count back 40 days, not including Sundays, and you will arrive on Ash Wednesday. Easter falls on April 21<sup>st</sup> this year and so counting back 40 days, except Sundays, we end up on Wednesday, March 6<sup>th</sup> for Ash Wednesday.

Camps and outdoor ministry is one of my passions, so as I set foot on the ground of two of our UCC sites on the west coast my mind will be thinking of our camps, VB Camp and VT OM, and ways to keep them vibrant. If you are wondering how you can get involved, please send me a note. I will reply.

Likewise, Lent can be a time to breathe and reflect, and let life's slower tempo open up space for discovery, for deep enjoyment of small things.

During March, we will continue reading the book, *Simply Jesus* by N.T. Wright. 

The residents and staff are friendly and appreciative of our help. The dinner we take consists of an entrée, salad, and dessert. 


