Pondering with the Pastor.....

After the death of 50 people in New Zealand, I was heartbroken and so very tired of the carnage and ongoing murder of innocent people expressing their God given right to

worship and praise the Creator of the Universe. Muslims, Christians and Jews worshipping God in their sacred spaces have been brutally killed by white nationalist as they prayed, studied the bible and came together in community. Mad white men have indiscriminately killed without compassion. And so, again, I sent flowers to the Islamic center of Vermont, our Muslim friends, and wrote a note to their congregation offering our condolences, love and support. It saddened me that as I sat in my office preparing to write a sermon that despite supporting our Muslim friends and our Jewish friends mourning the Pennsylvanian tragedy before that, I did not have a personal relationship with them.

Flowers and letters once a year in the midst of tragedy does not suffice for a relationship. So I shaped my sermon about the possibility of deepening our ties to our Muslim and Jewish acquaintances so that we might one day actually be friends; a friendship grounded in actual knowledge and experience of one another. And so I proposed, in the name of Jesus who broke down the barriers between people and encouraged people to love even their perceived enemies, for our church to begin a new initiative to regularly visit other religious traditions that we are woefully ignorant about AND those conservative Christian traditions in whom we struggle to find common ground. My proposal included having a group of five people visit places of worship on a monthly basis to establish a relationship with another tradition by bringing greetings from our church, learning about their traditions / rituals and by simply engaging with individuals of another faith or tradition.

So on the third Friday of the month we will have two groups of five going to visit Temple Sinai in South Burlington and the Islamic Center of Vermont in Colchester. And on the second Sunday of the month we will have one group of five going to visit Christ Memorial Church. When I passed out the clipboard asking folks if they wanted to participate, we had a plethora of folks wanting to participate: WOW! Unfortunately having more than five would be too many and I think for consistently and the possibility of deepening relationships, the team should be the same people each month. Unfortunately, that means that not everyone who signed up will be able to attend. However, it is my hope that this interaction will lead to shared events among these communities of faith and in the future all of us will be able to participate in those events: dinners, bible studies, mission projects, etc.

Due to Easter and other religious sacred dates, I thought it would be best to start in May. I will be sending out an e-mail shortly to those of you who signed up to see who can make this schedule and commitment to what I believe is a vital aspect of our faith in God and our passion for breaking down barriers and creating a healthier society. When you get my email, please consider your participation with prayer.

ASSOCIATE PASTOR NEWS

I have been deeply impacted by your love, grace, and support for me during this heightened stage of my Crohn's Disease. Spending nearly a full week in the hospital was alleviated by reading your Facebook comments, phone calls, visits, and knowing that I am loved. I am appreciative for the help in providing meals for me at home. You have shown me the love of God in a tangible way.

Crohn's Disease (CD) can cause inflammation in the digestive system, usually in the small intestine and colon. You might be aware of CD from friends or family member or, even, the millions of commercials for new, good medicines like Entyvio or Stelara (this is not a paid ad ©). It affects about 700,000 people in the USA. As of today, there is no known cure for CD; it might be years or decades before a cure exists (I hope years). We don't know yet what exactly causes CD. We know how it works, but not the exact cause. Those who live with CD can experience intense pain from inflammation in the intestinal area. The inflammation in the intestinal area sometimes heals on its own and sometimes it needs medicines to reduce the inflammation and hopefully put the inflammation into remission. Medications can keep the inflammation in remission, but inflammation can still occur even on the medicines. Up to 80% of patients with CD will need to have surgery to remove part of their intestinal tract. Since there is a finite length of intestines, surgery is avoided as much as possible.

I need to have surgery. I was first diagnosed with CD in February 2007 (12 years ago) during a six-day hospitalization. For most of the last twelve years, I did not notice many symptoms. Three years ago, I had one major flare up that left me lying in bed all day in pain. Ever since then I often have been able to feel and hear food move from my small to large intestine, with increasing noise and annoyance to me. This indicates that there is part of my small intestines that after years of inflammation, healing, and scar tissue no longer is flexible enough for food to pass through without notice. This January, I was hospitalized for CD for the first time since '07 and then again this March for a partial small bowel obstruction. I have about 5 inches of my small intestine that needs to be removed (though, it's called elective); otherwise, there's a risk that I will have another obstruction, leading to another hospitalization. I hope the surgery will take place within the next few months, preferably sooner. Having "elective" surgery should help ensure a better recovery time and lead to better long-term relief. The local surgeon is highly recommended. I am confident in his care, but surgery on internal organs has its risks and causes me some anxiety. I am largely being propped up via prednisone (which can also cause some anxiety) to keep any inflammation at bay until the surgery.

At this stage, I need your prayers and support. You are welcome to ask me how I am doing. There might be days when you see me at church, going strong, and then there might be a day when I am not. I will try to listen to my body and rest when I need it. I want to be your associate pastor for many, many years, and I want to stay in ministry for decades. I am always grateful for when someone ask me how I am doing. Please forgive me if my answer is long or short. But know that it touches my heart.

It is never too early to plan for National Youth Event (NYE)! **NYE 2020 is July 22-25**th @ **Purdue University.** Every four years the United Church of Christ hosts youth from all over the country to build relationships with other UCC'ers, grow in their faith practices, and worship God. NYE has workshops,

direct service projects, and engaging and inspiring worship. We'll hear from dynamic preachers like Pastor Traci Blackman, the Executive Minister of Justice & Local Church Ministries. Mark your calendars for July 22-25th, 2020!

Starting now our fundraising efforts will go towards attending the NYE. Our first fundraising effort, **Easter Breakfast is April 21st.** We need help with milk, fruits, eggs, baked goods, breakfast meats, and other items. Thursday, April 18th ~ Maundy Thursday ~ 6pm

Lent and Easter are sacred times for Christians for those seasons highlight the very heart of our faith. The cross and the crown are both vital roles of Christ and both help us to understand the mystery and power of the faith. The first service to begin to explore these themes is the Maundy Thursday service. Maundy come from the Latin "mandatum" which means mandate and connotes Jesus' command to his disciples at the Last Supper when he commanded them to wash each other's feet as well as to continue to share with each other the bread and juice. We remember the Last Supper and the events that made up the last night of Christ's life in which he was free to be with his disciples. We will share a simple meal of bread and soup as well as communion; all while having a conversation about Jesus and his ministry. The meal and the commemoration will be held in Fellowship Hall and last about an hour. All are welcome.

Friday, April 19th ~ Good Friday ~ 7pm

Good Friday is one of the most sacred days for Christians because it highlights Christ's model of leadership and use of power, his pathway to a deeper spirituality and his counter intuitive victory over the powers and principalities of this world. Through service and sacrifice he was able to overcome the evil and destructive forces that bind all humanity to a miserable life without meaning and joy. On Good Friday, we explore these themes and lift up Christ's way to a healthier and more fulfilling life. As you might imagine, it is not all balloons and laughter but sometimes the deeper aspects of faith require a thoughtfulness that explores areas of our lives that we do not often think about. So come on Good Friday and begin to grasp why the Christian Church has called the day of Christ's death good!? All are welcome.

Easter Services

Sunrise

As in past years, we will join our Catholic brothers and sisters and fellow community members for an ecumenical Easter Sunrise Service at 6:00 a.m. on April 21st at Holy Family Catholic Church by the gazebo, which is behind the church building. The service lasts no more than 30 minutes and includes prayers, a brief service and the classic Easter proclamation. Immediately after, everyone is invited to have breakfast together in our Fellowship Hall.

April 28th ~ 7th Anniversary Celebration of Becoming Open and Affirming

After a year of study and reflection, the First Congregational Church of Essex Junction voted 97-3 to become and Open and Affirming Congregation on April 29, 2012, seven years ago. This vote was the culmination of a long process of discussions and votes that first opened our church to civil unions under Rev. Steve Garvey's leadership. There were many voices of significance without that journey and many leaders of the church that guided us to the point of affirming our GLBTQ brothers and sisters. The final statement widened the inclusion to offer a wholehearted welcome to folks who have traditionally been left out of the church or disenfranchised within the church. LAURIE'S LENS

Lent ~ a season of prayer, reflection, meditation, spiritual renewal, time spent centering ourselves towards God, time with friends and family, and being aware of our temptations. All of these are present in the stories that we hear of Jesus on the six Sundays of Lent that lead us to Easter Sunday. We walk through Lent with images of Jesus and his ministry and are reminded of all that he endured in his life, his last week in Jerusalum that we call Holy Week and his final hours. Jesus prayed. He spent time reflecting on what had happened on his journeys. He traveled with his disciples and friends, making more friends as we moved from town to town. He went to temple. He worshiped. God, Jesus and Holy Spirit are always with us but so is our community and family of faith. The people we meet here at church and we know those who we can talk to about Jesus and not be judged, but be supported. Faith communities play a huge role in giving us the space and time to question, to learn and to grow as true disciples.

As I traveled around visiting other UCC churches, talking with their staff, having conversations with Jennifer from Middlebury as we reflected on all we heard, seeing some of these churches in action on a Sunday morning ...one could see and feel the drive, the call, the love of ministry that we all shared. It was so good to be in community with them, learning from each other and talking of how we all shine our beacon of love and light for the families that grace our doors. Every child needs a place where they can grow in their faith, know they are loved with a community of their peers who love God, where they are not judged, where they can continue to build a relationship with God, Jesus and/or the Holy Spirit. As I walk through these days of Lent and keep up with our busy calendar, I am putting together my notes from my three trips and a presentation that I will give to our Christian Education team and to Council. Dates are not fully set yet. I'm sure there will be a time set for all who want to hear about my travels and what I learn to come to. I will keep you posted. Thank you for all your support for me and the programs here at First and to many of you who stepped up in my absense and led, helped and gave of your time. You all are what makes this place of worship that we all call home so special.

As we arrive on Easter, April 21st, and celebrate our risen Lord, let us be reminded of all our gifts and talents that we have to share. Let us know hold on to them, but give them freely and willingly. Let us also give to those less fortunate, support those in need and remembering to be a humble and loving servant, like Jesus. Let us walk the walk and be a witness for all our children and youth to see and hear of what we say and how we say it. And as we move forward with the renovations to our church, let us give thanks for all the hard work hands and many hours of planning that will give new life to these walls and rooms. I don't know about you, but I am really looking forward to shouting that word we have hidden during Lent

DEACON'S CORNER

Greetings, everyone – and Happy April! We are soon approaching the start of construction on the various Capital Campaign projects, which is very exciting, but will also involve some disruption. With the construction of the new vestibule/entrance (and bathroom) at the parking lot entrance, the Deacons want to remind everyone of the need to use alternative entrances to the Church during that project. For those who use the elevator to reach the Sanctuary, we suggest using the rear doorway to the kitchen, on the Church Street side of the building. Although moving through the kitchen is sometimes awkward, using the rear kitchen door will allow you to safely reach the elevator, and avoid the stairs in the front of the building, as well as those near the church offices. Therefore you may want to try and park on the Church Street side, or park in the parking lot and use the sidewalk around the front of the building to reach the kitchen rear door. We will post additional handicap parking signage to make it easier to park near the front door, and will also have a wheel chair available near that entrance. We sincerely appreciate everyone's patience during this time, and ask that you let us know if there is anything we can do to assist you!

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN PROJECTS & UPDATE



Our Home, Our Future, Our Time Capital Campaign Update

The snow is beginning to melt away, which means that spring is just around the corner and OUR HOME is going to be <u>under construction</u> soon! A number of projects are slated for this spring....

The Organ! The organ cleaning, repair and maintenance project will begin in May.

The Vestibule! On or around April 1, the existing parking lot entrance/vestibule will be demolished and work to remove the oil tank will begin. Once the oil tank is out, then the construction phase for the new two-story entry AND the new ADA bathroom can finally begin! We anticipate that this phase of the project will be completed by the end of June.

The Parking Lot! Once the new vestibule exterior work is nearing completion, site work will begin to tear up the old parking lot, re-grade the area, and add new electrical conduits for better lighting. The hope is to have the first layer of asphalt on the parking lot by the end of August and before Rally Day.

Non-Historic Windows! Remaining non-historic windows will be replaced throughout the church in March/April.

Sanctuary Paint Colors – Color Option Survey on Sunday April 14 (Palm Sunday)! We are in the process of getting bids to restore the historic windows and repair the plaster in the sanctuary. This work *could* begin as early this summer, so it is time to decide on paint colors. Everything in the sanctuary will get a fresh coat of paint eventually, including the pews. Color options were recommended by color expert Betsey Dempsey, owner of Color Concepts in Shelburne. Betsey spent time in our sanctuary and came up with two top recommendations for the congregation to choose between. Both palettes include historic

neutral colors that are welcoming, peaceful, bright and timeless. If you haven't already, check out the samples and color concept boards in the sanctuary. We will have a Color Option Survey on Sunday April 14th (Palm Sunday).

LOGISTICS DURING CONSTRUCTION (watch for signs to be posted)....

- **Temporary Accessible Entrance: Use Church Street Parking & Back Kitchen Entry (by the choir loft stairs). Signs will direct you through the kitchen and around to the elevator if you need to use the elevator.
- **General Entrance Please use the front entrance (facing Rt. 15) or the Church Street/Office entrance.
- **Parking please leave spaces in front of Church on Church Street for those who need to be closer to the building. Drop-offs are encouraged. If our parking lot is not available, please use the overflow lot located at the Doctor's offices across Church Street. Stay tuned for more detailed information and posted signs as we get closer to breaking ground! Thank you in advance for your patience during construction.

Fundraising Update

The Capital Campaign total has reached \$955,049, thanks to some funding from last year's endowment distribution that was designated for the Capital Campaign AND the transfer of some unspent maintenance money from last year that was transferred to the church's capital reserve fund. The top priority in our stretch goal was to set aside \$25,000 for a maintenance reserve, so both of these transfers help us achieve that goal! And, this will free up even more of the pledges received to be used for projects. We have received \$604,149 of our pledge total to date. This is nothing short of AMAZING! Thank you to everyone for keeping up with campaign pledge payments!

Jamaica Mission Trip Update

Our team is very excited and getting ready for our service trip to Jamaica, June 22 – July 1st, 2019. We will once again be working with the White Horses Primary and Infant School in St. Thomas and with the Morant Bay Rotary Club. In 2017, we built a 30,000 square foot garden at the White Horses school. This summer we will take on a number of projects:

- We will be doing some maintenance work in the garden and planting or reaping crops.
- We will be building a playground for the preschool section of the school. In addition to providing a safe play area, this will allow them to become officially registered with the government, which will then provide them with additional governmental support.
- Finally, we will spend one day helping the Rotary Club with their Feeding Program. They will cook and we will help package and deliver food to previously identified people in need in the community. This will give us an opportunity to get out into some rural areas and meet families.

If time allows, we may be helping to build a simple and durable outdoor classroom for use when weather permits. The number of children attending this school has grown significantly in recent years and space is tight. We are also looking forward to interacting with the children at the school and playing some sports with them. Their netball team won the district championship in January and they would like to teach our youth how to play!

In May we will be collecting supplies for the school. We're currently in communication with the principal and will put out a list of needed items soon. As always, thank-you so much for your support of this program. This experience has a significant lasting impact on our team members and our work and our presence is deeply appreciated by our Jamaican partners.

For several years now, on the fourth Wednesday of each month, three First Congregational Church members have been preparing dinner for the residents and staff of the Dismas House in Winooski. Attending the meal are typically ten residents, two paid staff members (a Director and Associate Director who work at Dismas House during weekdays), and the three members of the Church who have prepared the food.



Our participation in this program is of great value in lessening the feelings of estrangement that burden many who have served prison terms. The residents and staff are friendly and appreciative of our help. The dinner we take consists of an entrée, salad, and dessert. We bring enough food to feed 15 people and stay to enjoy the meal with the Dismas House residents and staff.


