Passing the Peace

Passing the Peace of Christ is an ancient ritual of the church grounded in Christ's resurrection appearance to the disciples in the upper room when he breathed upon them and offered them peace. After the minister passes the peace of Christ, then everyone is encouraged to greet the people around you with Christ's peace. During this winter season where many have been sick, feel free to put your hands together in prayer and offer peace to your neighbor without shaking their hands. This will keep us all healthy and better able to come to church! We begin this ancient ritual with the following words....

Pastor: The Peace of Christ be with you. **People: And also with you.**

High School youth are welcome to join in as peer helpers. Adults can accompany children, get them settled, stay or return to worship. Pastoral Prayer

Each week during Lent, we will begin our time of prayer by having each pew [or if along in a pew, then pairing with the pew next to you] in focused dialogue about particular types of prayer. This will just take a small fraction of time and in the process, we will learn some of the various ways Christians have prayed through the centuries.

Today's prayer of focus is Suffering Prayer.

The Prayer of Suffering is not centered only on our own needs but also centers on others. In Suffering Prayer, we offer to God the various difficulties of our lives, the trials that we face and ask God to use them in a redemptive way. Suffering Prayer also encourages us to voluntarily take on the grief and sorrows of others in order to set them free. Suffering Prayer also encourages one to see how our own suffering has led to truth, meaning, growth and grace. One core of this type of prayer is not that God sends the suffering, but that God is suffering with us, crying at the injustice, weeping for those afflicted with disease and advocating for those suffering at the hands of despots and villains.

Speak to your neighbor about one way you have been able to use the suffering or difficulties in your life for the good, and then quietly hold hands and pray for the other person's prayer of suffering.




Tuesday Morning Sermon Talkback

April 14, 2019 Sixth Sunday of Lent (Palm/Passion Sunday) Luke 19:28-40

Into Jerusalem

Palm Sunday is a Sunday of possibility and expectancy. There's a colt and cloaks on the road, people shouting and a lot of excitement. Jesus is coming! There's a party atmosphere with neighbors that don't like the noise and tell Jesus to keep his followers quiet. But Jesus replies, "Even if everyone was quiet the stones would shout." Can you imagine feeling so much hope and joy at the entrance into your city or town of someone who represents not a political, military or sports victory, but the coming of peace itself?

The day after Jesus arrived in Jerusalem, he went to the temple and turned over the tables of people who were buying and selling and changing money. He drove them out saying, "my house shall be a house of prayer; but you have made it a den of robbers" (Luke 19:46). The economic injustice of the money-changers' profiteering in the temple infuriates Jesus and this is one of the few times we witness his righteous anger.

At that time, following Jesus meant making choices about whose side you were on. Christians still make those kinds of choices. But we followers of Jesus have not done such an excellent job of understanding his message of compassion and love. Instead, for two thousand years, we've often been part of the same kind of brutal power systems as the one in Jerusalem long ago. And all of this time, the God of compassion and love must have wept.

This week, as we stumble toward Jerusalem, we can rely on God's grace to carry us every step of the way and trust the unknown future to the God who works good in every circumstance and in every holy week of our lives.

Work this week for peace and economic justice. Here are some ideas:

Start a prayer and meditation group in your church with a focus on peace. Find ways to use your voice in solidarity with others who may not always be heard. If there are ways in which you are serving the master of money in your life, free yourself!

Put love into action: right some wrongs with an organization seeking economic justice.
