I recently posted a sign in my office: "Christianity is a way of life, not just a belief system." The statement emphasizes practice rather than belief. That doesn't mean beliefs don't matter. They do. It highlights the importance of how I live as a Christian. It embraces Jesus Golden Rule, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." The Golden Rule, of course, could be misused. That's why we also look at this rule within the lens of the Jesus commandment to love God and to Love neighbor as self. It's also why we remember Paul's words in Romans 12: "Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all."

You might remember the phrase, What Would Jesus Do? It was shortened to WWJD? There were even wristbands for it. You might remember it from the 90s. It originated in 1896 when a Congregational minister, Charles Sheldon, in Kansas wrote a book, In His Step: What Would Jesus Do? Christians in a town pledge to only do things after first asking, What Would Jesus Do? The book and phrase comes from movement in Christianity in the late and early 1900s called, the Social Gospel. The Social Gospel

movement infused the teachings of Jesus into daily life and the ways we interact with each other as a human family. In the 90s, the phrase became quite popular in Christianity after a Reformed minister discussed it with her youth group and convinced them to wear shirts with the phrase. Its how when most people hear WWJD; they know instantly what it means. Of course, the answer to WWJD can be different for people. But it's an interesting way to think about how to practice Christianity as a way of life. Part of our goal as we begin another faith formation year is to help our young people practice their Christianity outside of our church. We hope that it helps them become good citizens of the world.

We've had a busy summer with construction projects and Broadway Musical Sundays and Spirituality Group and making sandwiches with our youth to distribute to people who are homeless and Vacation Bible Camp. We have an exciting September ahead of us. September 8th is 9 am worship and then everyone and anyone are invited to walk with us in the Pride Parade in Burlington. Welcome Back Sunday is September 15th, back to our two services, with a cook out and games after the second service. And then, Kick-off Sunday is September 22nd for Junior Youth 11:30 pm and High School Youth Groups!

Capital Campaign

Your Capital Campaign dollars, our Trustees and many volunteers have been hard at work this summer! If you haven't been to church in a while, you will notice some exciting changes in and around Our Home when you return! You can also check our progress and see pictures on the Capital Campaign/Projects page at www.fccej.org. Here are the highlights:

New Vestibule Addition & ADA Bathroom – The exterior





of the new two-story addition an accessible bathroom near Fellowship Hall is nearly complete, and we anticipate having a finished bathroom and second story storage area by early September.

Parking Lot – Contractors dug up the entire parking lot to address drainage problems and divert water away from our foundation. Layer of asphalt down by the end of August!

New Sign – We said goodbye to our old brick sign, and a new sign will be installed sometime in late September/early October. The memorial garden bed that surrounded the old sign will be redesigned to feature lowmaintenance shrubs, the Peace Pole and a bench or two for quiet reflection. The Campaign hired landscape architect Silvia Jope, Old World Garden Designs, to help with the design and make other recommendations to create a welcoming, cohesive landscape plan for the church.

Sanctuary Windows & Shutters – The historic windows and shutters in the sanctuary have been removed and are being completely restored and

repainted by specialists off-site. Stay tuned for more details about when to expect them to be back in place.

Sanctuary Plaster Repair & Painting

- Due to the plaster specialist's availability, the sanctuary plaster repair and painting

project is scheduled for January-February 2020. The sanctuary's plaster ceiling is in worse shape than initially thought, so the entire ceiling will be removed and a new plaster ceiling installed in its place. Believe it or not, this is the most cost effective option! But it does mean that our sanctuary will be "closed" for about 2 months while this work takes place. The result will be a beautiful plaster ceiling that should last at least another 100 years. We are working on plans for alternate worship space (likely in Fellowship Hall) for that short period of time. As this experience literally draws us closer together, our prayer is that we may grower closer in spirit too.

Organ Repair & Cleaning – In late July, work began to repair and clean our organ so that our beloved music ministries may continue to flourish.

New Flooring in Pre-School

Wing – In early August, an environmental specialist sealed off the preschool wing of the building to remove asbestos tile in that area. Although this was a stretch goal project, we had a window of opportunity when no

people would be using the space due to the change of ownership of CPEC (preschool). New flooring will be installed in mid-August, just in time for the new preschool/nursery to open. Huge thanks to the volunteers who helped move all of the preschool supplies/furniture into and out of storage! We still plan to remove/replace the remaining asbestos tiles in administrative wing in a future phase of work.

Non-Historic Window
Replacement – This spring, we completed the replacement of non-historic windows. Stop by one of the Sunday School classrooms on the 2nd or 3rd Floor to see how beautiful they look – and how easily they open and close! Several of the Sunday School spaces and youth rooms have fresh coats of paint, thanks to Laurie and her crew of volunteer painters.

Church Safety – We applied for a Department of Homeland Security Grant to install keyless locks on our doorways and a controlled-access/visitormanagement system to allow us greater control over access to our building, especially during the week and outside normal business hours. We also requested funds to install interior locks on all classroom doors, and add better lighting on the exterior of the church. We should hear about funding decisions sometime in August.

We think that about covers it! The Capital Campaign Steering Committee will meet in early September to take a look at the big picture of project spending, the work that remains, and what to tackle next. We have raised \$955,494 as of July 31, 2019. We still have a little ways to go to reach our stretch goal of \$1.09 million. We are very grateful for everyone's continued patience while we are "under construction." We also appreciate everyone's timely (and in many cases early!) pledge payments. This has allowed us to

move forward on ALL of the above projects without bridge loan financing!

2019 Jamaica Service Project

For several years, my son Zach and I watched FCCEJ send groups of people to work in Jamaica, and then listen to their compelling stories afterwards. Each time we'd say to each other, "We should do that!" With Zach turning 16 last year, we knew that we had to seize the opportunity. And so it was, after about 18 months of planning, meeting as a group, fundraising, and studying the Jamaican history/culture, we boarded the plane early in the morning on June 23rd with 13 others from the FCCEJ community (along with many bags of building supplies and donations), ready to contribute our energy and Christian compassion on an international mission adventure. We arrived in Kingston, Jamaica that evening, getting a taste of the heat, humidity, and local cuisine. We met our bus driver Melvin, Sharon's longtime acquaintance, who would graciously shepherd us around all week (and put in long hours beside us on the worksite). We then drove into the night, along the long, winding coastal road to the towns of Lyssons and Port Morant, the sites of our school/project and

our lodging. Over the next 9 days, we would work shoulder-to-shoulder, sweating in the

searing heat, clearing the grounds, digging the foundation, and constructing a beautiful playhouse (with climbing wall, water table, and stairway) that we believe is strong enough to endure a hurricane. We'd add a see-saw ("teeter-totter"), revitalize an existing swing-set, and generally spruce up the grounds. We'd bond and play with the wonderful teachers, local helpers, and precious school children. I was amazed at the determination and resilience of our group, working under demanding conditions, all day long, sometimes several hours longer than planned. The end result is an inspiring playground that the school and its children will cherish, and for which all of us on the team - and FCCEJ as a whole - can be very proud. Our week concluded with a day assisting several local organizations distributing freshcooked meals to over 100 homeless and destitute people throughout the region. The poverty was shocking and heartbreaking, but we expressed our compassion to them, proud and grateful that FCCEJ sponsored all the food that was provided that day. Beyond these physical accomplishments, we also grew together as a team. Everyone contributed sincere efforts and ideas. Together we prayed and shared every meal, laughed and cried, learned about the joys and complexities of Jamaican society, negotiated, compromised (with each other, and with our local partners), and set aside our self-interest for the greater good of the mission. We

had the pleasure of attending a local church and mingling with its congregation. We visited Kingston for a tour of the Bob Marley Museum and dinner/dessert at popular local spots. We shopped in local markets, and experienced thrills jumping off waterfalls. In all that we did, we faithfully represented our country, our community, and our church. The trip was not without complications and challenges – first, the initial construction plans fell apart over some misunderstandings with our local partner, and Rev. Mark had to quickly (and quite impressively) develop a playground project from scratch (getting input from several experienced builders from FCCEJ). Then, on Day 1, the Delta Airlines counter was not able to efficiently check us in, and our trip leaders (Sharon and Carolyn) had their seats taken away at the very last minute! Fortunately they were able to meet us in Atlanta, but they had to first connect through New York, so we had to navigate through our complicated baggage check process into the international terminal without them. Sharon also ran into challenges getting money transfers to pay for building supplies and other expenses, as the local bank threw her some last-minute paperwork "curveballs". In addition, she and Carolyn had to quickly locate and hire some local workers to help move the two large piles of gravel and sand that had been unexpectedly dumped in the middle of the playground

(another misunderstanding). We also had to negotiate project decisions with our local helpers all of whom had very strong opinions about construction methods (watching Kaki and Nicholas use their mediation skills on our behalf was most memorable!). In the end, it was an experience I will never forget. I've thought about the people of Jamaica, the places visited, and our work together, every day since returning. I am so pleased that I was able to do this together with my son, and with everyone in the group. Everyone's hard work and effort was so impressive to me, particularly the work of our FCCEJ youth. It's made me appreciate all that we have here in our community and congregation. I am so thankful for all of the support and financial contributions from FCCEJ that make this bi-annual trip possible. I am especially grateful for Sharon's and Carolyn's tireless efforts in planning the trip, helping prepare us throughout the year in getting to know Jamaica and each other. leading such a memorable trip, and getting us all home safely. I would highly recommend this to anyone thinking about going next time – it's an experience you will treasure.
