

## Capital Campaign Update

The vestibule project (including new ADA bathroom & second floor closet) is wrapping up! The bathroom is available for use and the Deacons are designing shelves for the new storage closet. The parking lot renovations are also done, with the exception of the installation of new lighting around the property. We are awaiting final approval of a federal grant that would pay for the new light fixtures and installation. We need to wait until we have a grant contract in place before we can use those funds, so the lighting portion of the project will take a bit longer than expected. We are aware that this causes some inconvenience, but the delay will save us about \$10,000 if we can use federal funds for that work instead of paying for it with Campaign funds.

The **asbestos removal in the preschool wing** is complete, and new flooring has been installed. The new nursery tenant is in the process of painting, and then the flooring company will return to install rubber baseboard moulding. The historic windows & shutters are still being restored off-site. Last but not least, our old sign has been removed, and a new sign will be installed some time in late September/October along with some new landscaping around the peace pole.

As we wrap up a few remaining loose ends on the projects completed to date, the trustees and Capital Campaign Committee will turn our attention to the Marvin Lounge and Kitchen projects, which are the next big projects on our list.

# History of Constitution Week & Bells Across America

This year is the 64th anniversary of Constitution Week and the 232<sup>nd</sup> anniversary of the signing of the United States Constitution. The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution adopted an internal resolution on April 21, 1955, designating September 17-23 as Constitution Week.

Members of the United States Congress received the DAR resolution; and on June 7, 1955, the resolution was discussed in the Senate. The first resolution to observe Constitution Week was made June 14, 1955, by Senator William F. Knowland of California. Following the passage of the resolution by both Houses of Congress, President Eisenhower issued his proclamation on August 19, 1955.

The first observance of Constitution Week was so successful that on January 5, 1956, Senator Knowland introduced a Senate Joint Resolution to have the President designate September 17-23 annually as Constitution Week. The resolution was adopted on July 23, 1956, and signed into Public Law 915 on August 2, 1956.

This year in celebration of Constitution Week, the DAR is spearheading "Bells Across America". DAR Chapters across the county are asking churches, schools, courthouses, fire houses, veterans' homes, city governments, and individuals to ring bells on September 17 at 4 p.m. EST in all time zones so they are heard simultaneously from coast to coast. The local DAR Chapter, Green Mountain, asked us to participate and Council approved our participation. There is no standard number of times the bells are to be rung. We have decided to ring the bell 14 times – 13 for the original 13 states and one for Vermont, the 14<sup>th</sup> state. Pastor Mark and Dan Petherbridge will be our bell ringers

So when you hear bells ringing from our tower on September 17 at 4 pm, it is in celebration of the 232<sup>nd</sup> signing of the US Constitution. Everyone is invited to join in by ringing bells from their porches or come by and ring your bell while standing on the sidewalk or parking lot.

## A New Identity

Philemon 1:1-21

Faith Formation Sunday

Rev. Caela Wood of First Congregational Church in Manhattan, Kansas learned about Blessing of the Backpacks from another United Church of Christ colleague, the Rev. Jennifer Mills Knutsen. Five years ago, Wood's congregation started a regular ritual of backpack blessing on the same day Sunday School re-starts for the fall.

"We wanted to create space for kids to find comfort from their faith community when we know they might be filled with back-to-school jitters," Rev. Wood says. "We encourage adults who are going back to school to bring along backpacks, laptop bags, and briefcases, too. Our congregation has a lot of teachers and professors, so we also bless them on that same Sunday."

"The kids hand out the bookmarks to our many teachers. Lifting up our 'outside work' in the world helps us feel connected to the ways the Spirit journeys with us throughout the week...in classrooms and cubicles and in our homes and everywhere we go."

"We typically put out notecards during fellowship hour for each child/youth/college student who has recently moved away. We ask anyone who feels so moved to take a card and write a note to college students, children and youth who have moved away in the past few years. Then we stick a backpack tag in for them and mail it to them. I have heard from several parents that this is very meaningful to them as the kids are adjusting to life in a new community."

Unlike most other epistles which are addressed to communities, Philemon is a short letter addressed to a single individual. In today's reading Paul sends his adopted child Onesimus forth with this letter of blessing indicating how he would like Philemon to treat the youngster. The message of this letter, that Onesimus is trustworthy and hardworking, is perhaps as much for his student as it is for the man who will receive the letter. Onesimus knows that he has been loved, appreciated and supported and that he will continue to be. The young man has been sent into the world by himself, but he does not go alone. He goes with the knowledge that he has been truly seen and appreciated.

Today, on this Faith Formation Sunday, we celebrate the teaching that happens within our four walls. This day is also an opportunity to remember that the messages we send with our young people into the world teach them as much as any curriculum, maybe even more.

What messages do you give the young people in your congregation as they head out into the world? How can you let them know that they are valued, loved and supported even when they are not within the confines of the four walls of your church building?
