Pastoral Ponderings

"We grow through an intellectual journey and feel empowered to challenge, question and explore our faith."

These words are from the First Congregational Church of Essex Junction's values, actually the very first one. The value that it describes is inquiry. In 2014, after an intentional and exhaustive process, participants proclaimed that this value should be listed as our first value of our life together. What does it mean for worship when we list inquiry as a foundational value of the congregation? Just thinking about the answer to that question opens up avenues of thought that should keep us on our toes as we strive to explore what God's presence means for our individual and collective lives. It surely changes to way worship is presented and or the way we understand God. To believe that each week we come to inquire about God and how God's presence influences our lives is much different than coming to church for specific answers, doctrine or liturgies.

Our by-laws state in Article 2, section 1 under faith that, "We affirm the responsibility of the church in each generation to make this faith their own." Applying the value of inquiry and proclaiming that each generation needs to understand faith in their own terms dramatically changes the way our faith Formation operates. No longer do we sit in the class rooms and listen to what this or that scripture means, rather we strive to teach our children to claim the faith for themselves, to experience God and Jesus and the Holy Spirit for themselves and see how they apply it to their lives and our community.

Understanding scripture as a narrative where God engages people in life instead a rigid formula for defining God follows in this path of inquiry and claiming the faith in every new generation. Instead of listening to priests, prophets and sages about how we must follow God, we proclaim the purpose is to invite God into your life to comforting you when you are grieving, challenge you when you are ignoring your neighbor, saving you when despots oppress you, or simply to draw on God's strength when you are weak.

It is a change of perspective that has significant implications for our faith. It keeps God big and vital instead of a tool people use to affirm their own vision and ideals. It keeps the divine presence alive and active in our world in each new generation, nation and

people. It keeps all of us on our toes a bit, but it is part and parcel to what we believe as New England Congregationalists. Just listen to Rev. John Robinson who as the lead pastor of the Separatists in Leiden in the Netherlands shared these words as they left for a new land in 1620.....

We limit not the truth of God to our poor reach of mind, By notions of our day and sect, crude, partial and confined. No, let a new and better hope within our hearts be stirred. The Lord Hath yet more light and truth to break forth from his word.

Even in 1620, our ancestors knew that humanity had a way of turning our own beliefs into idols where self-righteousness and judgement led to most everyone else being cast into outer darkness. They had other groups do it to them and they were trying to not fall into the same trap.

We must follow in the steps of our ancestors and teach our children not to make idols of human constructs, even if they are ours. Teaching that does not make God smaller but ironically makes God more alive and bigger than ever. Come, join us on Sunday morning as we strive to experience more light and truth to lead us in our lives. It is our church's number one value, a key biblical command and religious ancestral legacy.

Associate Pastor News

One of the great privileges I have as your associate pastor is attending events in which our youth participate. I like to say, "Outside of your family and friends, I'm one of your (youth) biggest cheerleaders." Whenever I hear about an event one of our young people is involved in, I try to show up. It's a joy to see our young people perform in a musical or play or sporting event. They put a lot of work into whichever one they do, and in the result, it shows. I think it is important for young people to have non-family in their lives, showing them support and care. As its October, again, I encourage our youngsters to let me know when you have an event. I'll show and root for you. If you're afraid I will root too loud and embarrass you, no worries I never want to embarrass.

National Youth Event

National Youth Event (NYE), organized by the United Church of Christ, happens once every four years. Youth ages 12-22 come together for four days of worship, music, and service projects, often 4,000 youth are in attendance. National Youth Event is July 22-25 in Perdue, Indiana. I'm working with the Connecticut Conference to arrange transportation to the event. At this time, I don't know when we will leave or when we will return. I'm assuming we can add two days before the start of the event and a day at the end of

the trip, so July 20-26. The cost of each person to attend NYE will be about \$250. A final number will be settled on once I hear back from Connecticut. In the meantime, we need to start planning fundraising and getting an idea on how many youth want to attend. An informational meeting is taking place Sunday, October 13 after the second service in the Marvin Lounge. Laurie and I will be there to talk about NYE. If you have questions, ask Laurie or me.

Confirmation Class

Confirmation is an intentional time in a person's life, usually a young person, to learn more about Christianity, the Bible, faith, etc. During this time, they start to intentionally form what they believe and how they want to engage society. The confirmands attend other faith tradition's worship services, participate in community service projects, and participate in some capacity at church whether if it's through helping with faith formation, reading in worship, etc. It ends with Confirmation Sunday when confirmands who want to join the church publicly do so. Anyone in 8th grade or above is welcome to join the Confirmation class. It is a oneyear program. Confirmation class will take place most Thursdays, 7:30-9pm, between now and May 31st on Confirmation Sunday.

Confirmation starts with an orientation/welcome, parents and youth attend, on Thursday October 3rd, 7:30-8:30pm. Class begins Thursday, October 10, 7:30-9pm.

Capital Campaign

This week, crews began painting the interiors of the historic window casings in preparation for NEW storm windows to be installed. This is very exciting and will give quite a face-lift to the sanctuary! The new storm windows were custom-built to fit our space, so they will look less choppy and they will be clean and more efficient. Once the new storm windows are in place, the refurbished **historic windows & shutters** will be installed (in early/mid-October).

Our new parking lot entrance & ADA bathroom are available for use and the Deacons are designing shelves for the new storage closet. Our entrance is more accessible than ever, featuring automated door-opener pads. However, there will be a little more minor construction as we add a small roof above the vestibule entrance. We are still awaiting final approval of a federal grant that would pay for the new parking lot light fixtures and installation. We need to wait until we have a grant contract in place before we can use those funds, so the lighting portion of the project will take a bit longer than we hoped. We are aware that this causes some inconvenience, but the delay will save us about \$10,000 if we can use federal funds for that work instead of paying for it with Campaign funds.

Asbestos removal in the preschool wing is complete, and our Trustees and new tenant are working to get the space ready for the new daycare business to open. Last but not least, our old

Missions: Dignity for Strangers

Ed Steele and Josh participated in the protest march and rally at the Immigration and Customs Enforcement Data Center, located in Williston in an unmarked building. The protest was organized by the Peace and Justice Center and co-sponsored by 60+ organizations, including some of the major Jewish synagogues in the state. About 750 people attended.

One of the purposes of the event was to protest the conditions of the detention centers that are holding children, where there was not adequate food, water or sanitation and where children were taking care of children. Part of the problem is due to high numbers of those coming. Part of the problem seems to be from purposeful neglect. Part of the problem also due to not enough funds. And the mistreatment of refugees/migrants/immigrants is bipartisan by our nation's politicians. In community organizing for a better society there's a saying, "No permanent friends, and no permanent enemies." In other words, a political leader on one issue might be an ally and, on another issue, that same leader is an opponent. Some might wonder what the effectiveness is for showing up to protest outside an ICE Data Center, thousands of miles away from the detentions on the southern border. Showing up demonstrates to fellow denizens that not everyone approves of the way our government treats children at the border. As Ed wrote eloquently,

"The more people marching, the more forceful the statement the march makes. I knew that as one person, I couldn't contribute much to the cause but as part of a crowd of like-minded people, my small contribution could be greatly magnified." Regardless of immigration policy on numbers of how many people we should let in or even on needing a wall or not, there's an ethical and moral stance to treat refugees, immigrants, and migrants once they're here with dignity, many of whom are fleeing from violence. A commitment in the Christian faith to treat the strangers in our land with dignity comes when in the Gospel of Matthew Joseph, Mary, and Jesus flee to Egypt because King Herod wanted to kill the newborn Jesus. Jesus was a refugee, in a strange land. We hope he was treated well.

n 2018, the Neighbors in Need special mission offering and grant pool committee examined the ways in which it could spotlight, the UCC identity and missional initiative: 3 Great Loves campaign, **LOVE OF NEIGHBOR.** Emmaus United Church of Christ, in Vienna, Virginia, applied and received a \$3,500 NIN grant to aid them to work for justice within their community. They partnered with **VOICE** (Virginians Organized for Interfaith Community Engagement) in hopes of a securing the outcome they desired.

Emmaus UCC senior pastor, Rev. Kristen McBrayer shares, "In 2018 we set out to listen to our neighbors. We learned that the greatest concerns in our schools this year are student support for mental health counselors as well as the retention of 'good teachers'. From these listening sessions and meetings with key leaders, we set forth an agenda to increase the funding for mental health counselors so that students have a 250:1 ratio. This ratio is the minimum needed to provide basic support for our students. Retaining our best teachers is key to the suc-

cess of our school system. Increasing teacher pay is essential to this goal."

Additionally, Rev. McBrayer reports, "In October, 1,300 people from our VOICE institutions met with Virginia's Governor and Attorney General to ask for their support on our agenda. Among those present were more than 600 students, parents, and teachers concerned about our schools. The Governor continues to work with VOICE on funding for mental health and good teacher pay and we believe the ground work we did in 2018 has set the stage for some big wins for our students in the 2019 budget cycle and general assembly."

As people of faith, we are encouraged to advocate for all those who are marginalized by institutional systems as well as individuals. Being able to use one's voice, even at the ballot box, is a key to fulfilling that biblical missional mandate. We are proud to have been a partner with Emmaus UCC as they embarked to make a difference in their community to aid their neighbors in need.
