### Your Pastor's Ponderings

hen I was four years old, my father quit his job and with my mother, took us camping for eight months, travelling through our beautiful country seeing sights beyond our imagination. We had never camped before. We had never been trapped in a car for long periods of time before. We had never spent 24 hours a day together for seven days a week for months on end.

There were issues. sister always kept her window closed with her doll on her pillow on her lap even in the southwest with 100-degree weather. also kept her rock collection under her feet in the car. As I recall, we kids needed more breaks than my driving father was willing to offer as we spent hour upon hour in the cramped quarters. As the youngest in the family, it seemed that my mom was purposefully holding me back from following my older siblings into all the exciting places of our travels...no you can't go climbing freely in Mesa Verde or take the Gunnison Gorge hike or go swimming in the frigid waters of MacDonald. Lake Filthy bathrooms, weather extreme conditions. sibling bickering,

inconveniences of what seemed like primitive camping and random limitations on my behavior kept a regular flow of complaining ever present. I'm not sure how we survived camping together.

Funny thing, years after we finished camping, every member of my family looked back on our time together as the rewarding, most family strengthening and glorious time in our lives. We laugh about the rocks being thrown out of the closed window one day when my dad was sick of them littering the backseat floor. We relish the hot weather and now I revel in the fact that my dad and I went to the Hardware store while the rest of the family suffered miserably hiking the Gunnison trail. Taking Margaret on the Garden Wall trail in Glacier reminded me how I nearly gave her a heart attack as four-year-old went scrambling on some really dangerous sections of trail; she would laugh and share how proud she was of my early hiking abilities. And as I watch Robin Williams in his RV movie, I laugh remembering the bathrooms that made my skin crawl.

Interesting how time and perspective change our attitudes so greatly and how what was once horrific experiences become endearing moments of grace and

Indeed, they companionship. become endearing precisely because of those difficult situations; family my experienced, survived and even thrived in their midst. I have found this to be true through financial hardship, stressful transitions, difficult iob situations, disease and even death. God never wants our spirits defeated or our darkness defining. Jesus' resurrection sparks hope and demands an optimistic attitude even in the midst of difficulties.

Honestly, I have to say that I am a bit sick and tired of the transition and changes going on within the church concerning all the work within the capital campaign. The e-mails, conversations and decisions regarding almost every decision is such a burden. The details involved in living through all of the changes is exhausting and the financial implications daunting within our yearly budget talks. And in true congregational fashion, each decision invites critique, compromise and the possibility of a congregational meeting if our church leaders do not come to agreement or loud voices come to the fore. Kudos and extreme gratitude go to Kaki McGeary [the Capital Campaign Committee] and the Trustees who have overseen these projects. As I speak, we are getting ready for the biggest disruption of our entire capital campaign: the plastering and painting of our sanctuary where we must worship outside our sanctuary for months.

I journeyed down this road at a previous church and it was the

same. People grew weary of the change and disruption of the stable and comforting ways of normal church life. Fellowship Hall was not as sacred, usable or comfortable as the sanctuary. But like my family's camping trip, years after the work, everyone in the church looked back with pride, allowing the difficulties and disruptions to act as agents of cementing community spirit. My previous campaign, despite my original belief, was not about the money or even the church facility for that matter, it was about the strengthening of the community.

So, as we prepare to embark on the uncomfortable and disheartening iourney Fellowship Hall, let me invite all of you to suffer along with me as we create memories that will draw us together and deepen our relationships. Let me invite you to come and fill Fellowship Hall as we transform that space into the sacred, as we invest not only our money but our being into Christ's sacred family of faith, as we create history that will one day laughter, moans draw endearment and corporate strength of character.

I look forward to making history by having more people come to church in Fellowship Hall than during the regular non construction year. If you accept that challenge and make it so then I will host all of you at my home for a springtime party that will knock your socks off!!!

# Our Home, Our Future, Our Time: A Capital Campaign Update

### Sanctuary Restoration Begins December 29!

Starting on Sunday December 29 through Palm Sunday, worship services will be held in Fellowship Hall while the sanctuary is closed for restoration. During this time, temporary scaffolding will be put up so that our plaster ceiling can be totally removed and replaced. ceiling work will be done first and then it must cure for several weeks. While the ceiling cures, the cracks in our plaster walls will be patched. Next, the entire sanctuary (including trim and pews), narthex/main stairs and sanctuary stairwell will receive a fresh coat of paint...in a new color palette featuring pale creamy-yellow walls with white woodwork. trim and

Our staff and several volunteers have developed plans to make this temporary move as seamless and comfortable as possible. We ask for prayers that we move through this time of transition with flexibility and grace. We look forward to worshipping with you all in our new space on Sunday mornings starting right after Christmas!

### Security Grant / Outdoor Lighting

We got the grant! We received a federal grant of \$47,809 for improving security and safety at our church. This grant award includes \$10,000 for new parking lot lights! Also included are funds to add locks to all of our classroom doors and new "controlled access system" (keyless locks, video cameras at our two main entrances). Now we are just waiting on paperwork.:) Once we have it, we will install the new lighting in the parking lot! The other projects will take a bit longer to implement, so stay tuned for details. In the meantime, we are hoping to have lights for the steeple, church sign and thrift shop sign re-installed soon.

#### **Pledge Payment Reminder**

Your continued pledge payments are vital to our efforts! We have budgeted for bridge loan financing. While we have not needed it yet, our cash balance is getting low and we will likely need to secure a bridge loan for the Sanctuary Restoration. As always, early pledge payments are welcome to minimize interest expenses.

#### **Charitable Donations**

At our December meeting, the Missions Committee donated \$500 to the UCC Medical Debt Relief Program which partnered with RIP Medical Debt to forgive the medical debt of America's most vulnerable communities.: sick. the the elderly, the poor, and veterans. It also targets the middle class, driving many families who are barely getting along into poverty.

"The efforts of the UCC in the Chicago area served as a launching pad, in collaboration with the UCC's 38 conferences and almost 5,000 congregations, to medical debt relief efforts for those living at or below poverty in the 50 states and the District of Columbia we currently

serve." said the Rev. Traci Blackmon, Associate General Minister of Justice and Local Church Ministries. "It is the intent of the United Church of Christ to make this tangible ministry of abolishment deht in denominational regions another expression of the ways we seek to live out our commitment to Three Great Loves: Love of Neighbor, Love of Children, Love of Creation," Blackmon said. "We intend to contribute to a debt abolishment quarterly through Synod 2021, or as long as our churches desire to continue."

By forgiving this debt we strive to give struggling individuals, and their families, a fresh start. We hope to give those affected the ability to seek the continued medical care they need and help them back towards financial stability. The committee felt it was a worthy cause and deserved a generous donation.

Dismas House [Republished from the December 2019 SPIRT@FIRST Issue]

"Your Good Deed Will be Much Appreciated"

What is Dismas House? Across Vermont there are four Dismas Houses that provide shelter and support for men and women who have served prison terms and are making the transition from life in prison to life outside.

For several years now, on the fourth Wednesday of each month, three folks who attend our Church have been preparing dinner for the residents and staff of the Dismas House in Winooski. One of us prepares an entrée, another a salad, and a third a dessert. The three of us usually stay to enjoy the meal with the Dismas House residents and staff. They are friendly and appreciative of our help. By participating in the program, we help to lessen the feelings of estrangement that burden folks who have served prison terms.

Want to volunteer? If you have never been to Dismas House and would like to volunteer, at least one person from the Church who has already been to Dismas House will be going there on the Wednesday you sign up for. There is a sign-up sheet that's on the bulletin board in the hall leading to the Church's social hall.

How many? Attending the meal are typically ten residents, two paid staff members (a Director
