# Your Pastor's Ponderings......

One of my favorite scenarios to observe these days is when a member or friend comes to church for the first time since the pandemic began. They come in and find old friends and experience the power of not only God's presence but their brothers and sisters of the faith surrounding them. You can tell they had forgotten just how pleasant it can be to be a part of such a community and how uplifting it can be to your spirits to laugh, joke and commune with folks who are all dedicated to spreading God's love. And the icing on the cake is their expression and words upon seeing all the completed work of our most recent Capital Campaign. Some wear masks and others don't, but you can tell how meaningful it is to be back.

It makes me think of some of the parables we have been learning about in worship: lost coin, lost sheep and the prodigal son. When one coin is found, the owner of the house celebrates with great joy. The same is true when one lost sheep is found: the shepherd celebrates with great joy. The highpoint of this trio of parables is when the prodigal comes home after being gone so long. The Loving Father is so happy to see their long lost child, that he offers him a robe, ring, sandals and kills a fatted calf for a celebration. During the pandemic, I have lost touch with so many of our members who I used to see on a regular basis, but when they come back after a long absence, I feel like the loving father welcoming their precious child home. Most weeks have both older members returning, or guests who have checked out our online services, liked what they saw, and came in person.

Let me warn all of you that we have a great month planned for you. Reformation is the last Sunday of the month and there will be no less than **FIVE** significant events occurring on that day from bibles being passed out, to blessing animals, to social service agencies coming to share their message. There are lots of activities in the Faith Formation classes that day as well. But, in the weeks prior to Reformation Sunday, Stewardship will present a skit for the campaign drive, our congregation will vote as a whole whether to support the Vermont State Proposal to finally rid the state's constitution of vestiges of slave language. And we will have guests from both social service agencies, and one that will join us on the day we dedicate a tree in memory of loved ones that prematurely died. It is autumn, and we have many activities going on as we all settle into a new way of doing church in a post pandemic world.


I look forward to welcoming you all home.

The Catholic church and the Episcopal church, in October, celebrate the feast for St. Francis of Assisi. He died in October 1226. St. Francis of Assisi is well-known for his care for animals. As the story goes, he's in a garden praying to God when he notices birds have gathered around him. He asks them if he can share the Word of God with them. There are other stories that animals would follow him. When he was sitting down, a rabbit might jump on his lap. As part of the feast day, the priest holds a blessing for the animals.



Many Protestant churches are not known for the blessing of animals. As a friend once asked me, "isn't that a Catholic thing? I thought Protestants didn't do that?" The blessing of the animals goes beyond that, and it is nice to share a celebration like this with our Catholic siblings in the faith. We bless animals to ask for God's care for them and to express gratitude. Our blessing is to glorify God, to honor the ways we are intricately connected to nature, and honors the bond we have with them.

All items needed for your time together with the kiddos are laid out on Sunday morning, ready to be looked over before the 10:15am service starts.

# Jamaica Mission Trip - Update

Greetings on behalf of the Jamaica Leadership Team! We have been meeting regularly throughout the pandemic, and as many of you know, we've recently decided to postpone the next FCCEJ Jamaica trip to 2024. This decision was based primarily on the uncertainty of COVID situation in Jamaica in 2023 (the country continues to have low levels of vaccinations, although quarantine restrictions for reentering the U.S. from international travel were recently lifted). Probably related to that reason, we also have not been able to get a clear picture of how many church youth/families are ready to make a commitment at this time. Lastly, the COVID-related postponements this year have significantly condensed the time period in which to plan any trip, let alone a trip of unknown certainty.

Although we do not plan to hold a Calcutta in 2023, we are excited to announce that the Calcutta Committee has begun planning an alternative event in early 2023. Rather than holding a large Jamaica-specific fundraiser, our goal would be a smaller fundraiser to support FCCEJ mission activities more broadly, as well as to build awareness and enthusiasm for our Jamaica mission efforts (while providing the congregation with a chance to have fun together). In this way, we hope to grow enthusiasm towards recruiting a Jamaica team in Spring 2023.

As a participant on the 2019 trip, I think often of the friendships formed with our Jamaica partners, in that poor yet joyful corner of the island. I reflect on the impact it had on me – my first in-depth exposure to a developing nation. I marvel at the growth I saw in my son, Zach (who was 16 at the time), and the seven other teenagers in our group. I can think of no better way for them to see beyond their comfortable Vermont environs, to challenge themselves to work together on a grueling project, and to introduce them to our church's wider mission. The Jamaica Leadership Team looks forward to keeping the spirit of FCCEJ's Jamaica mission alive, despite pandemic setbacks. It gives me great joy knowing that future youth and adults will get to experience this mission trip, hopefully in the not-too-distant future!

# **Heavenly Cents Thrift Shop October News!**



# **Capital Campaign Update**

We're almost done! Thank you all for your generous support of the Our Home, Our Future, Our Time Capital Campaign. Together, we raised more than \$1 million (\$1,014,261.14 to be exact!) to restore our beautiful home, take care of several long-overdue maintenance needs and make our facilities more welcoming, safe and accessible for the future.

Planning is underway for our final Campaign project...a new floor for Fellowship Hall!

As you might expect with an old building, the project is more complicated than we imagined. As we began planning the project, we noticed that the floor was not level and we were concerned that this might be a sign of an underlying structural problem. Before investing in a new floor, the Trustees hired the structural engineering firm of DuBois & King to assess the floor.

Unfortunately, DuBois & King discovered that our live load capacity is currently 14 psf, which is well below current building codes that require a uniform design load of 100 psf for assembly occupancies. It should be noted that these weight limits are supposed to include people, equipment, stored materials and appliances. Even without having any people in Fellowship Hall, our chair/table storage, plus our Food Pantry freezers and storage cabinets, put considerable load on the floor. To increase the load capacity of the floor, we will need to add several new beam lines as well as additional supports along existing beam lines.

While DuBois & King did not observe any notable displacement or deformations during their evaluation, the Trustees recognize that this is something that needs to be addressed as quickly as possible. DuBois & King has developed detailed construction plans and is overseeing a competitive bidding process to help us find a qualified contractor. We know the project will be tricky and costly because the crawl space below Fellowship Hall is about 4 ft. high, making it difficult to access. This is where new footings will need to be poured and new beams added. Bids are due back in mid-October.

This critical infrastructure project is vital to the continued operation of our church, including the Food Pantry. It is key to our ability to host all-church gatherings, welcome community groups into our space, and to continue being a community center for Essex. We will make every effort to minimize disruptions to our operations during construction, and we will know more about what that will look like once we get the detailed quotes back from contractors.

This structural work is our top priority. The preliminary estimated project budget is \$70,000, which includes money for a new durable vinyl floor that can withstand the heavy wear and tear of the all the tables, chairs, foot traffic and food pantry carts. We have \$36,000 remaining from the Capital Campaign. We have applied for a grant to help with the remaining expenses and will hear back in mid-October. If grant funds are not approved, we may need to wait to resurface the floor. And, if the structural work ends up being significantly more expensive than projected, we may need to explore other financing options.

# **News from Trustees**

In addition to working on the Fellowship Hall project for the Capital Campaign, the Trustees continue to look after the rest of our building and grounds to keep things running smoothly, do necessary repairs and to save money wherever we can. It is impossible to calculate the money we have saved by having a dedicated, hands-on group of volunteers who take care of weekly boiler maintenance, minor plumbing and carpentry repairs, painting, groundskeeping projects and more. It seems like every time we think we have caught up, something else needs attention. Even as I write this, we have identified a few critical boiler repairs that will happen this fall. Thanks to all of the Trustees for their hard work: John Burnett, Dennis Conti, Ed Guild, Frank Smith and Art Winslow!

We also have a few bigger projects to tell you about:

# **Sanctuary Audio Visual Upgrades**

After many months (years!) of planning, discussion, consulting with professionals, re-imagining and waiting for quotes, we are nearing the finish line! Council has approved our request to use up to \$15,500 from the Memorial Fund to enhance our A/V equipment. Upgrades include two new PTZ cameras to be installed in the balcony (mounted on tripods to start), a portable joystick controller to make camera operation easier, and improved microphones. This long-awaited investment will enhance the livestream experience in terms of picture and sound, and special services like the Christmas Pageant will be easier to see and hear from home. Electricians will install new wiring in order to hide cables and provide a finished look. The price tag for this project is significantly lower than some of the early estimates we received (\$30K-\$70K), and we expect our final cost to come in a bit lower than what Council approved. Many thanks to Josh Simon and Ed Guild for spearheading this project. We are very grateful for the generous contributions to the Memorial Fund which have made this project possible.

# **New Fiberoptic Internet Service & Cyber Security - coming in November**

Council approved our recommendation to switch internet providers from Comcast to Burlington Telecom. This change will give us a dedicated fiberoptic service with much faster upload and download speeds than we are able to get with Comcast. This should improve our streaming capability and reduce, if not eliminate, the interruptions we sometimes experience on Sunday mornings during worship. The great news is that our monthly internet costs will decrease, and Burlington Telecom is not charging us anything for the installation or the cost of bringing fiber to our building. Our phone service will remain under contract with Consolidated Communications for another year. With the switch to Burlington Telecom, we are also investing in a new firewall that will better protect the church against the threat of cyber attacks. Thank you to Art Winslow for leading the effort to research providers and equipment, and to Linus Goedken for lending his expertise. Once again, generous donations to the Memorial Fund will cover the cost of the new firewall.

#### **Daycare Fence**

It has come to our attention that the fence surrounding our daycare play area is in severe disrepair. The fence is 40+ years old and needs to be replaced. A safe and secure fence is required for the licensing of the daycare operation. Although this was not a budgeted project, it is a safety issue and must be addressed without delay. We plan to save money by installing the fence with the help of volunteers, and receiving a contribution from Creative Discoveries (daycare tenant) to help cover of the cost. Special thanks to Art Winslow for researching options and pricing. If you have experience with fence installation or are interested in being part of a work team, please let us know!
