# Your Pastor's Ponderings......

#### 2021 Situation Overview in the Democratic Republic of the Congo

The Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) remains one of the most complex and long-standing humanitarian crises in Africa, with 5.4 million internally displaced people (IDPs) due to conflict as of December 2021. At the same time, there were 853,000 Congolese refugees and asylum seekers in neighboring countries immediately affected by the DRC situation, and almost 1 million Congolese refugees and asylum seekers across the continent as a whole.

Intercommunal conflicts and military offensives continued to trigger vast and repeated displacement of millions of people, especially in the east of the country. Gender-based violence remained a major concern, compounded by a weak judicial system and widespread impunity. In May 2021, the President of the Republic declared an état de siège ("state of siege") for the provinces of Ituri and North Kivu to address deteriorating insecurity. Despite these efforts, several parts of the country remained engulfed in violence and armed conflict at the end of 2021. This overall situation in the DRC was further aggravated by the COVID-19 pandemic, Ebola and measles outbreaks, severe food insecurity, and natural disasters including the volcanic eruption of the Mount Nyiragongo volcano in the east of the country in May 2021.

- Refugees and asylum seekers: 853,000, 50% women and 51% children
- IDPs due to conflict: 5.4 million
- IDP returns: 1.04 million
- Refugees and asylum seekers in the DRC: 526,000

Much of our geopolitical attention lately has been focused on the war raging in Ukraine. Our hearts go out to those who are suffering and putting their lives on the line to defend democracy in their homeland. For the last couple of years, and currently, we are sending a collection from the sale of bread and other avenues to that war torn country.

But dire situations arise in every corner of the earth. We should remember the religious nature of China's catastrophic treatment of the Uyghur Muslim community in China, civil wars raging in Syria and Afghanistan, the 50 million people in 45 countries that are facing starvation, the 324 million people in 63 countries that are dealing with natural or human made disasters from Yemen to Somalia, from Ethiopia to the DRC. Each of the countries affected could be the poster child for help in our country as life, livelihood and stability is challenged at every turn.

The challenge is always, what can we do to help? Our Food Pantry and Thrift Store help local folks in need but the millions that suffer in far distant places weigh heavy on our hearts. As followers of Christ, we embrace the theology each week of God loving all the world's children, nations and peoples.

And yet our church has stepped up to help a family from the Democratic Republic of the Congo by partnering with the United States Committee for Refugees and Immigrants [USCRI – formerly known as Vermont Refugee and Resettlement Program VRRP] by renting our parsonage to a family of nine people from the DRC. This was no small feat! The Trustees put in double duty to ready the parsonage early so that it would be a welcoming home when the family arrived. This involved a bathroom rehab, a new dishwasher, painting, and a deep clean. When the Missions Committee found out, they immediately allocated some funds to purchase last minute items for their arrival. Then the Food Pantry expedited their food distribution and sent over a huge amount of food to fill their kitchen and Kaki McGeary and I personally welcomed the family to the parsonage. And that was just the first two days!!!

During the last week of March, our church will complete the last project [Fellowship Hall Floor] of the Our Home, Our Future and Our Time Capital Campaign. We kicked off the campaign with initial pledges of \$650,000 out of our stated goal of \$822,000. Our church had never raised such an amount and no one was sure we could do it, so we added a number of projects as a stretch goal which then totaled \$1.09 million and to everyone's delighted surprise we ended up raising \$1,148,809! Almost, every room, surface, and floor in our facility has been upgraded and our church facility is in the best shape it's been in over 60 years! We will celebrate this great accomplishment in worship at both services. You will not want to miss this **PARTY**!

The new Congolese family just may come to church which would bring 5-7 new kids to our Faith Formation Program and allow all of us to not only welcome them to our country but offer them the light of Christ from what must have been a harrowing journey of both spirit and body.

The future is unknown and I have no idea if they will come to church, but regardless of that decision, we as a congregation have a concrete way that we can venture into the devastating world of geopolitical tragedy and actually help a family in need. They are grateful to be here and safe and have smiles and spirits to match their excitement, but let us not forget the hidden toll and toil that preceded their journey. Let us display the qualities of Christ as we help them assimilate into a new culture and climate.

They are open to getting to know people and invite folks into their home. If you are interested in making those

connections, please email me so that I and or the Missions Committee can coordinate those efforts. I will also be working to have a church Pot Luck to introduce them into our community and let them experience some Vermont hospitality.

Our time together in God's great outdoors, outdoor ministry, is very simple has great koinonia (Christian fellowship with God and with other Christians).

Yes, we are in a transition year with many things in transition in the life of the church. Please reach out and do your part to help our programs for the children and youth continue to be a strong part of our ministry here. I look forward to hearing from you all.



A huge grin spreads across Lorelai Mauger's face on a recent Sunday morning in the church Nursery, a clear indication that she loves this Sunday morning job, caring for children under age three, during worship.

"One of my favorite parts is watching the children change so much," Lorelai said. She is comfortably dressed in jeans and a sweater, ready to play with toddlers or hold a baby. In a corner is her homework for AP Lit and Math and Finance classes; if there are no children in the 8:30am service, she tries to catch up on homework, avoiding a Sunday evening last-ditch effort. But often she ends up chatting with the other teen working with her.

"It's just an easy way to get to know each other," she said.

The youth of the church have been employed as childcare workers on Sunday mornings since July 2022. They are paid \$20 per service. Adults from the Christian Education Committee and others, all of whom are background checked and arrive before the Nursery staff, are handed the first beeper and carry it to worship, ready to support if the staff need them (a rare occurrence).

For Lorelai, the chance to work in the Nursery provided an opportunity to return to church on Sunday mornings following the tragic and sudden death of her grandfather, John Mauger III, last September. "I just wasn't ready to come back to church services without him being there," said Lorelai, who has been part of the church since infancy. Lorelai is 17 and a senior at EHS. She also had to recover from the death of her grandmother, Carol Mauger, five years ago from cancer. Her grandparents raised her.

"Now I have a sense of responsibility on Sunday mornings," said Lorelai, who has worked in the Nursery since October. The church, she said, and her friends and wonderful cat, Ultear, "really have saved me" during the loss of the two people most important to her in her life.

She has loved watching Bethany Blake's youngest daughter become an active, talkative 20-month-old in our church Nursery, clarifying for her that working with children is a future opportunity.

For now, Lorelai is happy to share the memories of her beloved grandparents, contribute to the church, and feel loved in the church family. She grins, again, at the close of the service on February 12. "My homework isn't quite done, but I'm still going to watch my favorite team tonight. I'll never forget how happy my grandmother was when the Eagles won the Super Bowl last time!"
