#### Your Pastor's Ponderings......



It has been a long exhausting year with changes plenty significant and of opportunities for new initiatives. All of you that serve on committees or as church officers know that we are a busy church with lots and lots of balls in the air at any given time. We have over 100 people serving in various official roles and another 100 or so volunteers that are busy with particular projects or aspects of our ministry that require supportive

volunteers. Trying to stay on top of the details of our busy church takes quite a bit of time, energy and focus. Needless to say, I am ready for my vacation this year. Working long hours is not unique to ministry and so I would guess that many of our working folks are busy, stressed and in need of a vacation also. I only hope all of you in need of some down time will be able to find it as our church allows me to do.

In the past, I have also jokingly said that our church slows down and coasts a bit in the summer. However, the rest of my staff simply says that it seems that way because I am away on vacation, that in reality the church stays busy throughout the year, even in the summertime when I am gone.

What has struck me in past years is how well our church does when I am gone. In many of my churches, when I returned from vacation, I would be doing extra work to put out the fires that erupted when I was off galivanting. Our church's staff and lay leaders are incredibly talented and can easily conduct the business of the church in my absence. When I was young in ministry, I secretly welcomed the fires for the need highlighted my indispensable position in the church. As I have aged, I greatly appreciate the professional and competent way that our staff and volunteers step up to keep our church flourishing and moving forward: meaningful worship continued unabated, pastoral care still takes place, the unseen administration that undergirds all we do continues to happen, committees continue to plan and orchestrate events and plans for the future, the largest CE effort [VB Camp] occurs in the summer as does what I am sure will be the highest attended First Church Concert series, and the Nearly New Sale in August on our front lawn. In addition to all of these normally occurring activities, our officers and staff will advertise two positions and proceed to conduct the first interview as well as make progress with what the church will do with the old daycare space. It is a sign of our health that the church does not shut down when I am gone but rather moves forward with our many and varied ministries.

I have five to six folks that have agreed to provide coverage in case there is a pastoral need. People of course can wait until I get back to conduct a funeral or respond to a need, but how healthy our association of churches is to have so many that so freely offer their support. Naturally, I offer the same reciprocal support for my Champlain Association colleagues, but that is not the case everywhere across our denomination. As a congregation, we are blessed by the love and support of the 15 other Champlain Association Churches and their ministers as well as the Vermont Conference Staff, one of whom will be preaching one of the weeks I am gone. This is yet another quietly held positive truth about FCCEJ.

As I head out to recharge my ministerial batteries in the mountains of Colorado, it is reassuring to know that our staff, our officers, our committees, and many volunteers will simply continue to do their best in ensuring the continued work of our church in the lives of our members and for the wider community. Thank you all for this support and may God bless you all in your own efforts to get some rest.


### Deacons

## **Stewardship in Action**

#### Ed Steele - Longtime Dismas Supporter

"She's kind of shy," my interviewee said apologetically, meeting me in the hallway outside his apartment door. "If you just ignore her, she'll probably come around." Sure enough, within 45 minutes of church member Ed Steele chatting with me in his Essex Junction home about his key volunteer role supporting Dismas of Vermont, Betty left her spot by Ed's feet and wormed her nose into my free hand. My endorphins surged as Betty the beagle accepted me. It is that exact feeling of acceptance that Ed is so good at fostering, as he recruits and organizes volunteers to bring meals into the Winooski Dismas House on behalf of FCCEJ.

Dismas of Vermont provides transitional housing and support services for formerly incarcerated people, with a mission of reconciling former prisoners with society and society with former prisoners.

"I think it's really rough when people get out of prison," Ed said. "I feel like we're helping Dismas residents adjust to life outside of an institution, and support them as they become a valuable part of our society again."

Among the five Dismas houses operated in Vermont, two are in Burlington and Winooski. Some 300 volunteers in Chittenden County provide dinner to the residents, five days a week, throughout the year. Over 60 volunteers from FCCEJ provide meals on the fourth Wednesday of every month. FCCEJ is one of the ten churches and other organizations in Chittenden County providing meals.

Volunteers are encouraged to share the meal they bring into the Dismas House with the residents, dining family style at a large table with about 12 residents, and staff. Ed often eats at the Winooski Dismas House on the fourth Wednesday each month. "You can really get to know some of the residents," he said. "The connections can be powerful. I would think it's really rough when you first get out of prison, so having people from the outside come in makes the residents more comfortable with all types of people."

Dismas residents are working, or seeking work, and receive support from Dismas House staff and outside agencies with a goal of living independently. Volunteers play a key role in simply helping the residents feel confident and accepted; essential to becoming part of society again. Such a goal, pointed out former US Senator Patrick Leahy, at the Burlington Dismas House Annual Community Celebration in May, benefits all of society.

"I talked about what you do many times in Washington, especially in the Judiciary and Appropriations Committees when I was chairing them," Leahy said. "It was one of the areas where I could talk to both Republican and Democratic senators. We found bipartisan interest in affording people involved in the justice system a second chance. Many of these senators, like me, were former prosecutors, and they knew we had to do this."

"I was once asked 'why should an average citizen, who hasn't gone to prison, care about re-entry?' I said, because the vast majority of the people in the criminal justice system will one day be released. We all have a stake in ensuring they will succeed. It reduces recidivism. It saves money. And, especially, it's the right thing to do."

"Never forget," said Leahy. Never let up. There's always going to be a need. We Vermonters can fill that need better than anybody else."

Filling those needs, and connection, has always been important to Ed, who moved here at age 84 with his partner, who has since passed away. Ed is now 91 years old. He spent much of his adult life in Boston and New York City. Raised in both a Christian Science and an Episcopal church in Havertown, PA, he left organized religion at age 18 and didn't return to a church until 1992, when he learned that the Unitarian Universalist church in Flushing, New York welcomed members of the LGBTQQIP2SAA (then LGBTQ) community.

"Then I became very involved," he said. "The UU church threw down the welcome mat and I took on all kinds of volunteer roles." Ed and his late partner decided to move to Vermont in 2016, and in 2018 he took on his volunteer role with Dismas. He continues to organize the monthly meal contributions from FCCEJ. "If people at our church feel that 'new blood' should be doing this work, I would stand aside if that would benefit the program," Ed said.

He'll not let grass grow under either his, or Betty's feet, as he is in touch with Age Well Vermont about volunteer driving for this non-profit that provides support to aging Vermonters.

"I'll just keep contributing to society as long as I can," he said.


