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### Your Pastor's Ponderings......

One of my great blessings is to be able to get away for an extended period of time and rest, allowing my body, mind, and spirit to be fed by the time apart. This year we headed out west and spent most of our time at Rocky Mountain National Park. Even though I was on vacation, my thoughts turned reflective in nature as I pondered our church, her many ministries and the future. As we begin another program year together, let me share some of these ramblings.

To begin with, I do not think we are over Covid and many of our folks are still cautious about being in large groups like worship services. The coronavirus threw a monkey wrench into our lives and influenced how we live. I am impressed that when our folks are not feeling well, they simply stay home and watch the service in the safety and comfort of their own abode; a positive outcome of the pandemic. However, the time away has embedded itself into our psyche and I think there is a mental obstacle in physically going to church as well as a safety concern.

For those of you who enjoy staying home and watching worship in your pajamas as you sit around your breakfast table, I would encourage you to make an effort to come and experience in person the fullness of worship as manifested in community. We miss you! We want to see you face to face! We miss the sparkle in the eye, the conversations, the handshakes and hugs, and the uplifting feelings when we are all together singing or praying.

For those of you with a little extra time, I would encourage you to get your church directory and simply make some calls to the people who have gotten out of the habit of participating in church life; catch up with them and encourage them to come back to a worship service or some activity. I am going to gently ask if our staff and Deacons can do the same thing in a bit more organized way. When the pandemic started, the Deacons called folks to see how they were doing and if they needed anything. It's time to do so again.

The second reflection is that we need to ensure that two of the great pillars of the church that people gravitate to and that draw people into our community be strengthened. Our Music Program and our Social Justice Component each attract folks here and keep them engaged. Over the course of this program year I would like us all to work on strengthening these two areas. Volunteer for a choir or talk to our extraordinary Music Director, Bethany Blake, and let her know that you would be interested in helping to start up our bell choir. Let's continue to strengthen our quarterly musical series by attending them ourselves and inviting friends to join us. Perhaps you can even afford to give a couple of tickets away to neighbors you know would enjoy it. Our Social Justice Outreach is strong but could be better. The Social Justice Subcommittee of Missions is looking for members to focus on four distinct aspects of our public witness: Issues around race, LGBTQ+ inclusion, affordable housing and conservation. Part of expanding our witness is to partner with Vermont Interfaith Action [VIA] by having one of our members serve on their four areas of concern this year. They are a great organization that tries to get Christ's message of extravagant love applied to issues of concern in our state. The Racial aspect of our Social Justice Subcommittee of Missions is looking to host Sunday afternoon Social Justice Speakers on Race. These would parallel the Community concerts that we host and it is our hope that it would draw folks into our building for an afternoon of thoughtful engagement or education.

So, as we begin this program year, if you didn't get a call from me and would like to volunteer, please reach out. There are many ways to do so here at FCCEJ. Behind the scenes, as a Spiritual Friend on Communion Sundays, in our Faith Formation program, with our Youth Ministry planning team, alongside the youth, Vacation Bible Camp, etc.

Our Faith Formation Family Registration Form is updated for this program year and posted on our website. Parents, please fill this out if you are new to us or your contact or child information needs to be updated. Here you can check the boxes of the communication you'd like to receive from us.

New this year is a family form for Youth Ministry. Now, if you have more than one youth in your family, you no longer need to fill out duplicate forms for each of your youth. This is the form to register for youth gatherings and receive specific emails/updates about youth programming. General news and the calendar for Junior and Senior High Youth programs will continue to be in the church newsletters, Friday weekly emails and the Children, Youth & Family weekly Monday emails. Youth time helps to reaffirm church as a safe space for self-discovery, to build self-confidence, and strengthen a foundation that can be carried with them throughout their life. A valuable opportunity. It is foundationally about loving God, your neighbor, and yourself as we live in community with each other, passing on the love that was given to us so freely. It provides a place to unplug, gather with peers, and spend time relaxing in the Youth Room, along with other activities.

When I arrived, 15 years ago, I was hired to lead your Faith Formation program (then called Church School). The following year VBC was added. 5th & 6th Youth came a few years later, and then Young Apostles (3rd-5th), outdoor ministry camping and co-leading Junior High Youth. When I shared with leadership and CE my plans of retirement, I was glad they agreed to make creating, advertising and filling a Children's Ministry Coordinator's position a priority. This position will be someone to lead the children's Faith Formation up through 5th grade for the next few years. I would then be able to focus more on the youth, they know me and they are the ones who usually get lost in staffing transitions. My hope is by fall of 2024 HCR you will have another new person leading the youth program and I will go down to part time, supporting both the new staff. Leading your faith formation program has brought me joy, deepened my faith, expanded my knowledge of the bible along with getting to know the young families. I'm looking forward to passing on the torch and helping them get acclimated and watching them lead the program with new energy an eyes. If you know of someone, maybe it's you, who might be interested in the position please know that you do not need to be seminary trained; I was not. Years of experience in the field brought me to where I am today, along with yearly continuing education events, getting to know others in the field, sharing ideas and of course working alongside all the volunteers and children through the years. # **Church Planned Giving Update**

You will remember that FCCEJ launched a formal Planned Giving program in early 2023, including the creation of a new Legacy Circle for church members and friends who make a planned gift to our church. We are thrilled to announce that several church members have already included FCCEJ in their wills and/or estate plans. Legacy Circle members will be an invited to attend an annual reception and may choose to be recognized in the Annual Report. When you designate a planned gift to FCCEJ, please notify Rev. Mendes or a member of the Planned Giving committee so that we keep accurate records and add you to our growing Legacy Circle.

In May, ten people attended our first estate planning/wills clinic, led by local estate planning and elder law attorney, Holly Lemieux. We plan to offer these free informational clinics on a yearly basis, with the next session in April/May 2024. The biggest takeaway from this seminar is that every adult should have a will – with or without planned giving - and some basic healthcare proxy documents.

### What is a Planned Gift and How is that Different than My Annual Gift/Pledge?

Planned gifts are different than annual stewardship campaign gifts, which provide vital funding for day-to-day operations and reflect your support for the church's mission and programs for a given year. Planned giving asks you to make a long-term commitment to the church's mission and leave a legacy for future generations. A planned gift supports FCCEJ's long-term endowment fund and is made out of your accumulated assets through your will or estate plan. Several examples include bequests, beneficiary designations from insurance policies or IRA's, a charitable gift annuity or gifts of stock. Each of these examples are fully described under the Planned Giving tab on the FCCEJ website.

### Planned Giving Myth: I don't have much and I don't have an estate!

Nearly everyone has an estate. Your estate is made up of everything you own!

- Real property land and buildings on it.
- Intangible property accounts.
- Tangible property your stuff.

No matter how large or how modest, everyone has an estate and something in common: you can't take it with you when you die. Estate planning is making a plan in advance of an emergency and naming whom you want to receive the things that you own after your lifetime.

The Planned Giving Committee suggests you consult with your attorney, insurance agent, or financial advisor before making a planned gift.

**<u>Giving that grows</u>**. Like a mustard seed, your planned gift will grow over time and is a way, both financially prudent and spiritually sound, for you to support FCCEJ's mission and ministry for future generations.

# **Stewardship Through the Decades**

My first plan was to review the stewardship reports in past annual reports of the church to find the most successful ones and tell their story in this article. The reports all said things like "most successful in terms of the number of pledges received", "greatest percentage increase ever seen", "most funds pledged in history of church". Since these results could be due to variables like a larger church membership or the changing value of the dollar, it soon became apparent, I needed to change my focus. So starting at our church's beginning, this article will highlight a sampling of stewardship campaigns and fund raising drives.

- 1873 A women's group managed victualling (selling food) at the Chittenden County Fair. No easy task as it was located in Burlington near the corner of North Street and North Avenue. Getting there would have required travel by horse and wagon or by train and then walking several blocks from the train station to the fairgrounds. \$366.23 was raised toward a fund for a future parsonage. Converted to 2023 dollars, this is \$9,284.24.
- 1880 An envelope system for collection of pledges was adopted.
- 1913 The church voted to repair & remodel the church and build a parish house. Cost was approximately \$18k.
- 1925-1927 \$5,000 was raised to purchase a pipe organ as a memorial to past members.
- 1953 "Every Member Canvass" proved a great success to the church both financially and spiritually.
- 1960 (June) Men of church conducted an Every Member Canvass to raise funds for construction of the administrative wing. Total cost \$90,000.
- 1970 303 pledges were received including 60 from Sunday School children. The total amount pledged from the children was \$600 (are any of those children still members of FCCEJ?).
- 1973 A financial milestone occurred: the membership pledged more money than was requested.
- 1976 A special appeal to help rebuild the South Hero church, destroyed by fire, raised \$2,000.
- 1989 A postcard was sent to all members announcing an Every Member Canvass on Stewardship Sunday, asking them to be home as a fellow church member would be visiting.
- 1990 Barb Blanchette did sketches of each of the church committees. Committee members provided the functions and aspirations to include with the sketches.
- 1999 Three "Double Your Pledge" Sundays raised \$6,654.25 for high priority parsonage repairs.
- 2001 The stewardship campaign theme was "We Gather Together". Cornucopias, cornstalks, pumpkins, and real apples were used to symbolize a gathering harvest. The campaign was concluded by announcing the pledge total during worship followed by singing of the hymn "*We Gather Together*".
- 2005 A church-wide financial meeting was held to share information and gather information from the whole congregation for the 2006 direction.

Other stewardship campaigns that did not give much details of what they entailed but are intriguing:

- 1985 The campaign theme was a pony express with trail bosses and station agents.
- 1988 The campaign consisted of branch managers and tree bosses with Fred Allen's real maple syrup buckets visiting each church family.
- "Neighborhood Books" and "Pick-up Drivers" were mentioned several times.

The 1990 Stewardship Campaign theme was "Caring and Sharing for the New Millennium".
