# Your Pastor's Ponderings......

Some of you may know that I have wanted a bear to come into my yard for quite some time. I am strangely drawn to bears and have identified with them for a very long time and I think it would be cool to be able to tell my friends from the civilized parts of my past that I had a top predator and powerful creature in my back yard......"well that's life in Vermont" I'd tell them with a twinkle in my eye and a little pride in my voice.

Well, last night it happened. As I walked out on my deck around 1:30am and enjoyed the cool air and the silence of a night without the IBM hum, I saw it, a good-sized black bear in my neighbors back yard, maybe fifty feet away. The familiar gait and ramble of their walk assured me that it wasn't a big dog but an actual bear in my sight. I laughed with sheer enjoyment at the thought! The moon was bright so it was easy to see but the night shadows finally lost him/her to their nightly meanderings. I did not walk over to the neighbors fence to observe where it got off to in the shadows since bears are powerful and could do me significant harm if surprised or protecting their cubs. With a contented sigh, I enjoyed the moment a bit longer and went to bed.

This morning, I got up and as is my custom, walked out on the back deck to see what the day would bring. There right in front of my eyes was the evidence of the bear's visit the night before. The big black night visitor must have made it to my yard and pulled my bird feeders and suet feeder down to consume their sustenance for the upcoming winter hibernation: proof of the visit! It will cost me some money for the privilege of having the bear in my yard!

It is a strange feeling to be drawn to bears but to be a bit scared of them as well. They are magnificent creatures of great beauty and strength, but besides ourselves, they remain the top predators of our continent. They pretty much go and do what they want. As I pondered these thoughts, it occurred to me that many people understand God in the same way. They are drawn to God's presence from their own primordial depth, but are a bit cautious due to the powerful nature of the Divine and God's freedom to go and do whatever they want. And like my nocturnal visitor, God surprises us and leaves evidence of their presence spewed around the backyard of our lives. Naturally, when God enters your life, there will be a cost associated with the privilege.

Some cannot connect the dots and see the results of God's visitation. Some are fearful of the power and simply do not go looking. Some throw caution to the wind, spare no cost and devote significant portions of their time in their search for the Creator's presence in our world. Most folks are cautious but yearning, so remain safely on their decks a decent distance apart, seeing glimpses, shadows and results of God and that is enough.

It is my good luck to have seen a number of bears on trails and roadsides with my favorite experiences being those where I am alone on a trail and come across a lone bear. Some have stood up on their hind legs, some have taken a good long look at me and some have barely noticed. All of the experiences have embodied both the ecstatic joy and cautious fear of being in their presence. My experiences of God have been the same. As we approach the Advent Season when we acknowledge God's presence coming into the world, let us open our hearts to welcome God anew. Let us approach God with humility, knowing the unlimited power displayed over the centuries. Let us face our fears knowing that neither bears nor God are our natural enemies. Let us look for the evidence of God in our midst knowing that it is spewed all over the universe and our lives. And let us keep our feeders and our suet out a bit too long so that God might come looking......

# Stewardship Through the Decades (part 2)

In the stewardship article in the September newsletter, I asked if any long-time member could shed some light on a few stewardship campaigns that are intriguing. To refresh your memory, here they are:

- 1985 the campaign was a pony express with trail bosses and station agents.
- 1988 the campaign consisted of branch managers and tree bosses with Fred Allen's real maple syrup buckets visiting each church family
- "neighborhood books" and "pick up drivers" were mentioned several times

Rev. Mark responded, "The Pony Express came out of the UCC denominational offices and had saddle bags and included having riders go to each home and pick up the pledges like the old Pony Express folks. For many years, there was some type of gimmick like that to entice people to give and/or make it a bit lighthearted."

Mary Winslow also remembers the Pony Express. She said: "I do remember some about the 1985 campaign that had a pony express theme. There were "trails" developed with several families/couples/individuals on each trail based on the physical proximity of the neighborhoods. There was a paper saddle bag used for each trail that had pledge cards and information in it. This saddle bag looked like the leather kind that would sit behind the saddle on the rump of a horse and hang down on each side of the horse. The saddle bag was delivered by the trail boss to the first person on the list. That person completed their pledge, put the sealed pledge back into the saddle bag, and brought the bag to the next person/family on the list. The trail boss monitored the progression of the saddle bag to make sure the delivery back to the church was not impeded by any "lame horses" or "pokey riders". My children were young then and they enjoyed helping to deliver the saddle bag to the next person on the list and they enjoyed learning about the original pony express. That's what I remember. I hope my memories are correct and not skewed by the many years since 1985."

There may have been some "lame horses" and "pokey riders" back in 1985 but I'm sure that in 2023 there are none at FCCEJ and all the pledge cards will be returned by Pledge Sunday, October 29.



Did you know?

The Blackfoot tribe can be referred to as "Blackfoot" or "Blackfeet," though the Blackfoot call themselves the Niitsitapi (nee-itsee-TAH-peh) or "The Original People."

"Blackfoot practices are often rooted in ancient stories. For example, they say that once, when Napi was being blown about by a strong wind, he grasped a black birch. The tree bent but did not break, enabling Napi to resist the buffeting gale. To this day the Blackfoot make their tipi pegs from black birch. They believe that just as this tree helped Napi, it will also keep Blackfoot tipis from blowing down."


