Your Pastor's Ponderings......

Last night blanketed our land with the cold whiteness of snow: winter has begun. In Miami Florida, where I grew up, there were different seasons but nothing so dramatic and life changing as snow and cold. We had the windy season and the dry season and the rainy season, but nothing that demanded the trees to change color and drop their leaves while the world awaited unique frozen droplets of water that made everything look fresh and new. There is something magical about the seasons and cycles of awe inspiring earth and having our religious rituals dovetail with earth's cycles inexplicably genius. How can this confluence of the physical and spiritual do anything but touch our souls with a power and presence that is both deep and ancient?

So I love the Christmas narrative and all of its lessons for our lives. It's a sweet story, but within this ancient pericope are all the lessons that Jesus teaches later in his ministry if we have eyes to see and ears to hear. The birth narrative is like an opening paragraph in a dissertation that hints of things to come. Iust listen.....

The Birth as Incarnation: When Jesus was born he was defined at Emmanuel which means "God with us". This has become the hallmark doctrine of the birth narrative and it simply means that the God of the universe is not some entity up and away from us but a presence that walks and talks with us and enters history and our lives with purpose and promise. Jesus brings the presence of God into our lives.

The Intimate Connection between Body and Spirit: With God's Spirit embedded in the body of a human woman, we see the intimate connection between the physical and spiritual world in our midst. The physical becomes sacred and the spiritual becomes embodied within us. Jesus being both human and divine reflects that same reality reflected within the earth and every single living creature on our planet. Jesus makes our existence filled with sacredness.

God's Call for Justice: One cannot love Christ's birth narrative and not see Christ's challenge to the rich and powerful of the earth. Mary's song promises the rich and powerful will be brought down and the poor and oppressed will be lifted up. All of the prophesies in Isaiah that promise the coming Messiah speak of this same movement of justice. This is poignantly seen when Herod kills the innocent babies since the Messiah threatens his rule and hold on power. One can easily see this reality in Christ's humble beginnings, Mary riding on a donkey, shepherds being included in the miracle and the escape to Egypt. Jesus stands for justice even before he speaks.

The Inclusion of the Magi: Not only were the poor included in Christ's birth but so were the intellectuals of a different culture who came to bear witness to the reality of the Christ child and God's entrance into our world. Mary, the chosen vessel for carrying baby Jesus, was a young woman who was having a child out of wedlock. Non Jews, the poor, perceived sinners with questionable values, hard working business people trying to make ends meet: all were included in the story of Christ's birth. Jesus widens God's welcome before he can even walk.

<u>Sacrifice and Pain</u>: part of Christ's story is the cross and the pain he suffers at the hands of humanity and life. No one escapes the vicissitudes of this life with its tragedies, fears and anxieties and Jesus embodies this reality in the birth story. Naturally, Mary feels the pain when she gives birth and when she hears that her heart will be broken due to Christ in her life, the young holy family feels it when the prophetess Anna expresses who Jesus is and what he will do, they feel the fear as they flee for their lives across the wilderness to Egypt as children are brutally murdered. We romanticize the story but a bare manger, a foreign land, prophecies of doom and judgement all add the pain that came into their lives when Jesus was born. Jesus shares the anguish of pain and suffering with all of us.

Love Comes and Remains: Our God loves us and does not want us to be scared of the divine presence but rather feel the ongoing and consistent nature of God's love for us. In John's birth narrative we hear that God sent Jesus to us because of God's love for us. Time and time again throughout scripture, God just keeps coming to us for relationship and mutual love. We sense that love in Mary's and Jospeh's love for their child. We see that love driving the shepherds and Magi to the manger. We see that love every time we hold our own children and want the best for them.

You have to love the opening paragraph of God's thesis about coming into our lives in a real and palpable way. It's the beginning of the church year and it tells us what is to come both in our lives and in the world's reaction to God's presence. The church's seasons and the journey we go through all year with the selection of scriptures and rituals tells the same story. So let's get comfy in our overstuffed chair and settle in for the tale of a lifetime. Looking forward to sharing it with you.


Parents of college students, please share send me their college addresses. We are planning to send out packages in the new year.



New Planned Giving Program is Working

Look around our church! Everywhere you turn, you can see the legacies of those who came before us. Examples abound! New and updated programs, missions and facilities have been funded by members of FCCEJ past and present – all contributions gladly made to ensure our church survived and thrived not just in their time, but in future years.

The new Planned Giving Program launched in February 2023 is working!!! We are thrilled to announce that we have four Legacy Circle members who have decided to include FCCEJ in their wills or estate plans as a way to provide transformative and sustaining support for FCCEJ's mission – now and forever. Can we make the Legacy Circle bigger? As you consider your own legacy and how to support things that matter most to you even after your lifetime, here are a few planned giving basics:

What is a planned gift? A planned gift is a donation designated for FCCEJ or other organization for a later date, often through formal financial or estate plans. Unlike annual gifts, planned gifts are typically made from accumulated assets. At FCCEJ, planned gifts support the long-term Endowment Fund, leaving a legacy for the future. The larger the endowment, the more money we have for the future.

How do planned gifts keep growing and help our church? Your planned gift will help to grow FCCEJ's Endowment Fund. As the value of the Endowment Fund continues to grow over time, the amount of revenue available for the church to spend increases as well. Endowment funds support special projects in three areas: missions and outreach, education and youth, and capital needs.

How can I leave a legacy? You do not need to be wealthy to leave a legacy through a planned gift. Some common planned gifts include:

- A gift through a will or trust
- Gifts of appreciated stock
- IRA required minimum distribution (RMD)
- IRA or life insurance beneficiaries
- Charitable gift annuity

Many planned gifts have tax benefits. We encourage you to talk to your attorney or financial advisor to discuss planned giving options and what might be right for you.
