All of you made this December a month to be remembered!!!

Now Baby Jesus is born with all the hoopla and celebrations that a new birth brings into our world. We were prepared for the birth with rooms readied, food prepared, music practiced, guests cared for, presents wrapped, and sensitive interpersonal landmines protected against erupting. Sounds a little like my family! It takes an enormous amount of energy to get through this season.

But anyone who has brought a baby into their lives knows that when you finally bring the baby home the work begins! My great niece in Colorado just had a baby girl and she is discovering this truth. Her and the father's lives

changed dramatically over night; now instead of movies and eating out there are diapers and feedings, doctor's appointments and wellness check-ups, sleep patterns and clothes to wash, books to read and people to talk to and a vigilance in oversight that perhaps was not there before the birth. Plus the good parts of seeing new behaviors every day, listening to baby glossolalia and maybe even a word or two, and the simple joy of watching a baby discover every aspect of the world around them. And despite the changes, parents will tell you that the demands grow with the child along with the costs until your entire life is caught up in your child's life. I do not think it is an exaggeration to say that who you were before the birth and how you lived changes completely.

Perhaps that is the entire point of the birth narratives, for when you accept Jesus into your life, it changes. The beginning point is naturally significant, but then the work begins. When you bring the baby Jesus into your life, your life changes dramatically; learning about The Way requires some reading and talking to others in the faith; following Jesus requires a different type of food in order to flourish; now instead of bars, self-absorbed activities, and purchases that feed yourself, there are food pantries and thrift stores, taking care of other's needs, and refocusing your thoughts and emotions to care for others. There are constant wellness check-ups, but as you grow into the faith there will be new behaviors every day, new ways of understanding the universe with wonder and exhilarating joy, and as you grow into the faith the costs will continue to grow until you are so totally caught up in God's world that you will be a new creation.

And seeing how age does not have much to do with this process, I look forward to experiencing this journey with you. As always, I am,

The 2025 Giving Tree Program was a resounding success! We had 54 children in the initial sign-up, for a total of 162 tags. This year, we provided a second distribution day for families that missed the sign-up deadline. That additional day, we served approximately 20 families, most with at least two children in their household. This puts the total number of children given assistance at over 200—so awesome! As a reminder, the tags provided each child with two articles of clothing and a book, toy, game, or gift card. Along with the gifts, there were winter coats, donated by Essex Rotary, hats and gloves and Hannaford Gift Cards, provided mostly through donations from our amazing FCCEJ community, and bags of Christmas candy. The second distribution day was a little less formalized, but everyone received a box with at least two gifts, a bag of candy, and a gift card, and many also accepted a winter coat.

Sincere thanks to all who contributed to this vital ministry in our community:

- ◆ Everyone who selected a tag—many of you generously took several!
- ◆ All the volunteers who helped assemble boxes, set up the tree, assisted with tag distribution, collected and sorted gifts, put bags of candy together, organized the coats, set up tables, and helped out on the distribution days.
- ◆ Raymond's Hallmark for donating a majority of the boxes we used to organize and give out the items.
- ◆ Jen Dooley and Linda Bogardus, who were instrumental in the planning, organizing, and implementation—they totally ROCK!

- ◆ And a huge shout out to Elaine and Francis Raymond, who, with servant hearts of gold, keep this important ministry going for years. It's a testament to their dedication that it took a village to replicate their efforts!

Can You Spare 5 Seconds to Save a Life?



I'm pretty sure that many of us grew up being told to cut apart the plastic six-pack holders before putting them in the trash, so that no animal or bird would get its head or body stuck in them and be unable to eat or fly or simply function. If you don't already do so, I would ask that you start. It's so easy and literally does take only five to ten seconds. Depending on just how the critter is entangled, it can mean a slow and painful death, that you can easily prevent.



These six-pack holders are not the only human-made contraptions that pose a danger to wildlife. Cartons of cream, and sometimes milk, have a little “tab” that you need to pull out in order for the liquid to pour out. “But they're so tiny,” you say, “How can they possibly hurt anything?” Think mice and other small rodents who can easily slip their heads into them causing strangulation or preventing them from being able to eat. The cream I use has one of these, and I don't just cut the loop once, I cut it twice just to be sure.

Two more human creations that pose a threat to wildlife are the handles on paper shopping bags, and much worse, the ear straps on the face masks that people discard anywhere they please...parking lots, sidewalks, lawns, etc. PLEASE cut or rip off both of these before properly disposing of the bags and masks. Cats are notorious for getting their heads stuck in the bag handles.



Critters who frequent our landfills can get their heads stuck inside the glass or plastic containers that we toss in the trash. If it's a plastic container, like those that mayonnaise often comes in, it can be washed out and then cut in half before disposal. Sadly, the same can't be done with glass containers, and breaking the glass before discarding might injure those working in our landfills. So, we do the best we can and hope for the best.

Thank you very much for doing what you can to help wildlife, and please pass this information on to your family members, neighbors and friends.

It was a highly successful program. In this uncertain time where people are struggling with food insecurity and loss of benefits, the need is definitely there.
4. Provide Audio/Visual Support. We're looking for a few more people to assist with streaming our worship services. It is not difficult or time intensive. Streaming our services is crucial to reaching out and providing a connection to folks who no longer drive AND to people checking us out before they come in person. We also receive requests to stream memorial services, so that family and friends who are not able to attend in person may still celebrate the life of their loved one.

SERMON TALKBACK

Join us every week on Tuesday mornings to discuss Sunday's message and the various elements of the service from the previous week. 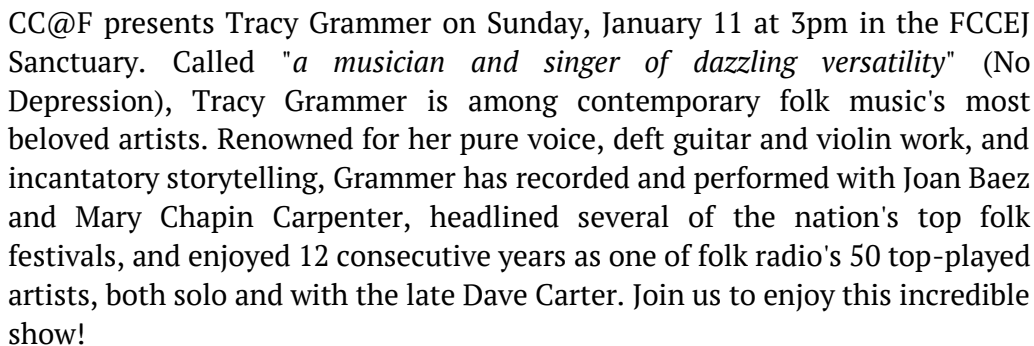
